New Laws Passed

The July summer season started with a bang and I'm not talking about a fireworks display.

We must keep in mind Connecticut has experienced a steady decline in population over the past few years as people depart for other states. This outmigration is particularly noticeable among high income earners in Connecticut, which is why the state continually finds itself in state budget deficits. So, in response to the outward migration, the Democratic Majority in the General Assembly passed a series of new taxes.

Here are a few of the one's that became law, therefore making it even more costly to live and do business in Connecticut.

- Governor Malloy had a corporation business surcharge passed by the General Assembly years ago that was set to expire July 2019. Instead in the state budget, the legislature and the governor extended the 10% corporation business tax surcharge for two additional years.

- The Democrats in the General Assembly also increased the fee you pay for an Uber or Lyft, or any rideshare from each ride that originates in the state.

- Democrats in the General Assembly passed a provision in the state budget that imposes a 10-cent fee on single-use plastic bags provided at the point of sale beginning August 1, 2019 and will be banned completely beginning July 1, 2021. Under the bill, each store must report all fees it collects to the DRS commissioner with its sales tax return and remit the fees at the same time and in the same manner as is required for the sales tax, handing businesses another onerous and costly law force to manage.

Another issue with the state budget is money and fees we pay for certain programs now are being taken and used for other purposes going against the intent of the fund.

Well, they are back at it again. The sale tax you pay when you buy a car is supposed to go into the Special Transportation Fund (STF), which residents were told was a lockbox for use of road and bridge repair and construction. But in this state budget money collected from the sales tax on cars for the next two years will be diverted from entering the STF and instead be deposited into the General Fund. That money will now go and be spent on non-transportation projects even though the governor is claiming the state needs tolls because we don't have enough in the STF.

In 2017 the legislature created a Passport to the Parks program to fund our state parks which appears as a \$10 fee on your vehicle registration. The new budget raids that Parks fund for other non-park state expenses.

I am also concerned about a study the Connecticut State Office of Management and Policy (OPM) is directed to undertake. OPM will be required to study state fees and report recommended increases by February 5, 2020. The total amount of the fee increases must be at least \$50 million and will result in another round of taxes next year.

I bring these new taxes up to show you there was not one conversation about reducing state spending. That debate never happened, and from what I witnessed there are people in the State Capitol that don't want to have this very important conversation even as many taxpaying residents leave our state in droves.

I will continue to update you throughout the year as new laws go into effect.

Legislators Meet with Wolcott Seniors

WOLCOTT - State Rep. Gale Mastrofrancesco (R-80) and State Sen. Rob Sampson (R-16) were invited to speak by the Wolcott Senior Center to provide a legislative update on the issues near and dear to Wolcott seniors. Both Wolcott legislators joined dozens of energized seniors and guests to review the 2019 legislative session. "It was great to be so welcomed by this important and often under-represented part of our community," said Mastrofrancesco. "Almost every policy passed in Hartford last session will make it harder for seniors to live in Connecticut. Our seniors need to know that we are fighting to keep their community affordable especially seniors living on fixed incomes and can't keep paying for more and more taxes."

"It's always great to speak with the citizens of Wolcott," said Senator Sampson. "Along with everyone else, seniors are definitely concerned with the ever rising cost of living in our state. We did accomplish some good things this past session but sadly, the focus is likely to remain on burdensome new taxes, anti-business regulation, and the dangerous super-sanctuary state policy that passed despite my loud objections last session. It seems that Connecticut keeps taking steps in the wrong direction. I want them to know they can count on me and Rep. Mastrofrancesco to keep pushing back on Governor Lamont and advocating for less taxes and more freedom."

Issues discussed during the hour conversation ranged from the state's role in enforcing our federal immigrant law, high state taxes, items that used to be untaxed, that will now be taxable, government spending priorities and their thoughts about the economic impact of tolls on our state highways.

In light of the recent comments from Governor Lamont, Attorney General Tong, and several Democratic legislators, I thought it important to set the record straight about Connecticut's insane law and policy concerning illegal aliens living in our state who have criminal records, are known gang members, and are wanted by federal immigration authorities.

These Democrat leaders repeatedly omit the word "illegal" or even "undocumented" when referring to immigrants who are not here lawfully, in an absurd attempt to blur the line between those who came here legitimately and those who crossed our border in violation of our laws. Apparently, they also want us to ignore the fact that some illegal aliens also happen to be criminals.

Shockingly, federal immigration authorities attempting to uphold our laws and protect us are accused of racism, fascism, and worse by Democrat elected officials. It's worth noting also that those subject to the so-called "raids" are not just undocumented aliens. For their own political purposes, they offer drivers licenses, tuition discounts, and social services benefits to those who would bypass our lawful process of immigration, ignoring and insulting those immigrants who are waiting in line to come here the proper way.

I don't believe I have the right to speak for all Republicans but I think it's important to make it clear what my positions are on this subject. I believe they are in line with other Republicans and the vast majority of Connecticut citizens.

In contrast, Democrat leaders across our country seem to like the status quo. Their policies have created an entire population of fearful people who live in the shadows, preyed upon by criminals - human traffickers, gangs, drug dealers - and unable to work lawfully. These politicians benefit from a dependent population which they take advantage of at election time, and they falsely paint as bigots and racists those of us who disagree with their destructive agenda.

I reject that disturbed and immoral policy and so do an overwhelming majority of Connecticut residents.

I could list quite a number of misguided policies taking Connecticut in the wrong direction. None is worse than the misguided expansion of the "Trust Act" passed earlier this year, that puts criminals who happen to be undocumented aliens above the law, restricting local and state law enforcement officials from cooperating with federal authorities on the subject of immigration, even when they have the person in custody.

Every Republican in our state legislature voted against this dangerous policy, also known as Senate Bill 992. How did your State Representative and State Senator vote?

The Dental Implications of Sports Drinks

Are sports drinks the best way for athletes to refuel after a game? It's not uncommon to see a rainbow of sports drinks on the sidelines of the field. As high as 62 percent of teens drink at least one sports drink per day. These sports drinks are marketed as a superior alternative to water in order to rehydrate and replace electrolytes lost during sweating. However, the truth of the matter is that plain water is best for the average child or adolescent. Sports drinks contain high levels of sugar, typically in the form of high fructose corn syrup, in addition to minerals and electrolytes. It is this sugar content that fuels the oral bacteria in our mouths that cause cavities. When particular oral bacteria ingest sugar, lactic acid is produced as a by-product. This acid causes demineralization of the surface of the tooth and results in a cavity over time. When children are stepping off the field periodically to rehydrate with a sports drink, they are continually feeding the bacteria that are responsible for tooth decay. In doing so, their oral environment becomes more acidic, and the individual is more prone to develop cavities. The American Academy of Pediatrics is in agreement with the American Dental Association in its recommendation to avoid, or restrict, the intake of sports drinks. Due to the low nutritional value and the high sugar and calorie load, sports drinks are also a potential contributor to the growing childhood obesity and diabetes epidemics. General consensus from the medical and dental professions tells us that there is no better substitute for re-hydrating either on the field or at the lunch table than old-fashioned H₂O.

- Tell your healthcare provider about all your medication. Ask your doctor what interactions your medications might have with other medications or supplements your taking.
- Prescription medications should not be shared with anyone and never take a prescription medication that is not prescribed for you.

Storm Preparation

During and after a hurricane, you may need supplies to keep your family safe and healthy. Remember that a hurricane could cut off your power and water supply. You also may not be able to drive because of damage to your car. Roads may be flooded or blocked That's why it's best to be prepared — stock up on everything you might need now. Be sure to:

Prepare an emergency water supply. Have at least 5 gallons of water per person (which should be enough to last 3 to 5 days)

Prepare an emergency food and medicine supply. Put together a 3 to 5 day supply of that doesn't go bad (like canned food). Don't forget pet food and pet supplies. Gather any prescription medicines and personal care products. Create a "To-Go Bag," with a flashlight, batteries, sleeping bags and blankets, cell phone charges, etc.

Health Tip of the Week!
 Grilling

Follow these steps for a safe and enjoyable grilling season.

Separate

When shopping, pick up meat, poultry, and seafood last, right before checkout. Separate them from other food in your shopping cart and grocery bags. To guard against cross-contamination, put packages of raw meat and poultry into individual plastic bags.

Chill

Keep meat, poultry, and seafood refrigerated until ready to grill. When transporting, keep below 40°F in an insulated cooler.

Clean

Wash your hands with soap before and after handling raw meat, poultry, and seafood. Wash work surfaces, utensils, and the grill before and after cooking.

Check your grill and tools

Use a moist cloth or paper towel to clean the grill surface before cooking. If you use a wire bristle brush, thoroughly inspect the grill's surface before cooking. Wire bristles from grill cleaning brushes may dislodge and stick into food on the grill.

Don't cross-contaminate

Throw out marinades and sauces that have touched raw meat juices, which can spread germs to cooked foods. Use clean utensils and a clean plate to remove cooked meat from the grill.

Cook

Use a food thermometer to ensure meat is cooked thoroughly. When smoking, keep temperatures inside the smoker at 225°F to 300°F to keep meat a safe temperature while it cooks.

145°F – whole cuts of beef, pork, lamb, and veal (stand-time of 3 minutes at this temperature)

145°F – fish

160°F – hamburgers and other ground beef

165°F – all poultry and pre-cooked meats, like hot dogs

After Grilling:

140°F or warmer – until it's served

Refrigerate

Divide leftovers into small portions and place in covered, shallow containers. Put in freezer or fridge within two hours of cooking (one hour if above 90°F outside).

**Wolcott Historical Society News

This year the Wolcott Historical Society's Annual Garden Tour was held on June 29th because of the Fourth of July holiday. The day may have been cloudy, but the garden visitors saw brilliance in the seven hidden treasures situated around our town.

Perennial gardens are not for the weak or weary; it takes hours of strenuous work to create and maintain these "labors" of love. Each garden featured in this year's tour had its own specialty, but all had a common thread: tranquility, beauty, and peace.

Three of the gardens were located on Woodtick Road. The first was at the home of Tracy and Frank Schippani, where angels and small shrubs surround a bubbling waterfall in their front yard garden. As you walk under the arbor into the backyard another water feature and numerous blooming perennials welcome you. A tall picket fence borders the north side of the property and is lined with honeysuckle vine, yarrow, and asters to name a few. The backyard is meticulously divided into gardens of day lilies, peonies, large hydrangea and a beautiful new addition to the garden, a pergola. In the center of the pergola is a large garden angel surrounded by a variety of perennials. You can't walk by the south side of the property without noticing the magnificent clematis vines and lilies. Beauty surrounds this yard, which was a pleasure to view.

Continuing next door on the south side of the Schippani property is the home of Deb DuBois. This is a continuation of glorious gardens winding throughout the property. Gardening is not new to Deb, and her creative flare for designing floral arrangements spills out into her own backyard. Deb has worked with indoor and outdoor plant materials on a regular basis for many years; she has an uncanny ability to arrange flowers and colors while placing them in just the right place in her yard. Deb creates garden rooms throughout her property, with each room consisting of different themes. She uses beautiful statuaries to accent each area as well as many different, unique plants and a vegetable garden too. The variety of plant material found in Deb's yard is amazing from peony gardens to her meadow garden and numerous trees, vines and shrubs. It's always a pleasure to view Deb's gardens.

A short drive down Woodtick Road from Deb's house you will find the home and gardens of Paula and Bill Ronalter. It's exciting to view these gardens because Paula's creative ideas and use of unique plant materials will boggle your mind. Interesting antiques surrounding the property and beautiful containers with tropical plants add to her garden design. Although the property borders a busy road, tall shrubs provide a perfect barrier from the noise and allow you to enjoy these hidden treasures. The exterior of the old garage has been transformed into various gardens combining interesting antiques and plants. There are so many small, but uniquely designed gardens tucked into this property that you must walk slowly to enjoy it all.

Just off of Todd Road on Woodcrest Avenue you will find the beautiful gardens of Kathy and Tom Sullivan. A newly added front porch and steps adds to their beautiful property and garden design. As you enter this natural wonderland you are drawn into an array of colorful plant materials. They have large areas filled with hydrangea, climbing hydrangea, lilies, ornamental grasses, daisies and other perennials vigorously blooming around you. They utilize shade perennials to their fullest extent and have also created theme garden rooms that show off their garden creativity. As you gaze into these woodlands, you see a palette of muted colors, but the blue hydrangeas are outstanding. Their water garden is filled with lily pads and other aquatic plant material as well as colorful fish, which create a soothing atmosphere. These gardens too require you to walk slowly through them because there is so much to view.

Two houses down from the Sullivan's on the same street you will find the gardens of Jim Hackett who should be named "champion of container gardening." He uses huge pots to show off his unique tropical plants and large annuals grown from seed. These are placed along his house and driveway and welcome you into his perennial gardens. One can meander through his property and enjoy glorious statues and water gardens filled with water lilies and very large cory; one in particular is named "Big Bertha." Jim has also created a unique composting area that is hidden by thriving hydrangea and hosta; he utilizes his garden space to the fullest. Both of the gardens found on Woodcrest Avenue are truly "paradise found."

In the western section of town on Rustic Acres you find the home of Pat and Ed Traver. Ed is a member of the International Hosta Society and a "hosta authority" so if you have a hosta question, just ask Ed. Gardeners from near and far have viewed these gardens and marveled at the way Ed has arranged and named the numerous varieties. BUT, there is more; the day lilies, grasses and hydrangeas add color throughout the yard, as well as a tri-colored beach tree that adds shade. The grass pathways lead you through the gardens and into a beautiful in-the-ground pool right in the middle of this "paradise found." Ed also added a new greenhouse and was able to get an early start on planting his dahlias. He had several large beautiful dahlias blooming. Ed also has been busy making changes to both sides of his front yard gardens since the last time he participated in our tour. As you enter this property beautiful perennials from every angle welcome you. It is always a pleasure to walk through this garden paradise.

Last, but far from the least are the gardens located just around the corner on DiSanto Drive at the home of Carol Jurzyk and her husband Bob. Carol loves gardening and Bob loves to build wonderful structures and grape vines to enhance their backyard. Since they have joined the garden tour several years ago Bob has added two sheds and an outdoor shower. Carol loves her gardens and the buildings Bob has created and they are proud to share them with visitors. As you enter the yard from the driveway a brick walkway leads you into several raised beds filled with perennials and shrubs. The unique and creative garden rooms welcome one and all. The use of different types of plant materials and statuaries throughout these gardens add color and atmosphere to them. Bob has also built a fence along their back border with many birdhouses and a deck off the back of the house; all of these are surrounded by small gardens. Bob loves growing grapes and has been making wine from them for sometime now. This too was a paradise found!

If you missed our tour this year be on the look out next year because you will not be disappointed; we are fortunate to have so many beautiful gardens right in our own backyard. Plus by participating in this annual event you help to raise funds for our scholarship that is given yearly to a graduating senior from Wolcott High. We thank everyone who helped to make this event a success.



Electric toothbrushes with bristles that rotate together in one direction, and then switch and rotate in the opposite direction — a process known as rotating-oscillating — appear to be more effective than manual brushes and other electric brushes that spin in only one direction.

A Review of June

- ♦Average Daily High: 79.9 F / Normal: 79.6 F / Departure: 0.3 F above normal
- ♦Average Nightly Low: 58.8 F / Normal: 57.3 F / Departure: 1.5 F above normal
- ♦Average Monthly Temperature: 69.4 F / Normal: 68.5 F / Departure: 0.9 F above normal
- ♦Highest Temperature: 92 degrees on the 28th
- ♦Lowest Temperature: 48 degrees on the 4th


- ♦Precipitation: 2.24" / Normal: 4.35" / Departure: 2.11" Deficit

A horrible spring improved during June. For a change the rainfall came in below average and we added some consistency in the "normal temperature" department. The flip of the weather pattern is due to the annual retreat of the jet stream north into Canada, allowing the southern heat ridge to expand in our direction. The pattern has become accentuated in July with 10 of the first 15 days of the month experiencing daytime high temperatures at or over 90 F.

A Look Ahead through August

We're into the "dog days" of summer but already signs of change! Daytime highs in August fall from the lower 80s on August 1 to the middle 70s by the months end. Nightly lows begin to fall, from the middle 60s to the lower 60s. This change is directly correlated to the decrease in daylight. In the evening sunset becomes earlier from 8:09 PM at the beginning of the month, to 7:26 PM by August 31. Rainfall tallies 3.23" on average, mainly due to passing showers and storms, but we need to start closely monitoring the tropics. A "cluster" of hurricanes in the middle 1950s impacted Connecticut with devastating flooding. Carol struck on 8/31/54 and Connie and Diane hit back-to-back starting on 8/3/55.

- **Mary's Meadows**, The Urban-Cordeau Preserve, 18 acres located on Minor Road. This preserve will be open to the public for hiking and stargazing in the near future.
- **The Finch Brook Preserve, 64 acres, features a 2.5 mile rustic hiking trail open to the public, a wetlands bog bridge, and two footbridges. This trail is part of the Connecticut Forest and Park Association's Blue Blazed Trail system and is listed in the current version of the Connecticut Walkbook. Access to this trail is from the cul-de-sac at the end of Barbara Drive.**
- **The Russell Preserve**, over 8 acres off of Seery Road.
- **The Hitchcock Lakes.**
- **Five additional** smaller properties of significant rural and environmental value.


