
Can one little clothing collection shed located at one little non-profit in one little town really make an impact? Yes!



The Bad and Ugly Bills Proposed

t the Capitol, there are days when I just have to shake my head. Hundreds of bills are introduced during the legislative session and when I read some of them, it's hard to believe that someone

dreamt them up. And if you think these types of laws can only pass in California, I have news for you, it's happening in Hartford right now.

Allowing children to get vaccinated without letting their parents know? Giving illegal immigrants the ability to vote even though it's unconstitutional? Forcing motorcyclists who don't wear a helmet to donate their organs if they die in a crash? Issuing fines to people if they don't vote?

These aren't just ideas; they're the bad and the ugly bills that have actually been introduced by members of the Democrat majority. They are proposed by far-left legislators that, as drafted, are illegal in some cases. In other cases, these bills are aimed at pushing an extreme progressive agenda that benefits special interest groups at the detriment of average taxpayers, parents, and property owners and infringe on our constitutionally protected rights and liberties.

These are just a few of the actual bills proposed this session (and there are more):

HB 6396 – Excludes parents from providing input when they disagree with the teaching of certain subjects on gender, race, racism, and climate change.

HB 6491 – Targets gas stoves in peoples' homes based on their emissions and proposes their replacement.

HB 5702 – Weakens election integrity by allowing people who are in prison to become electors and vote in municipal and state elections.

SB 229 – Allows striking employees to collect unemployment benefits, even though they chose to go on strike.

HB 5520 – Much like the federal government did with the hiring of 87,000 IRS agents, the bill calls for the hiring of new Connecticut tax agents, which will likely lead to more audits of average taxpayers.

HB 6109 – Prevents property owners from using a background check or credit check in determining the rental to a potential tenant.

HB 5323 – Provides taxpayer-funded FREE healthcare to undocumented immigrants (which will carry a massive cost to taxpayers).

HJ 19 – Resolution proposing a state constitutional amendment to lower the voting age to sixteen years old.

HB 5480 – Strips parental rights by allowing children 12 years and older to obtain vaccines without parental consent.

And while there are the bad and the ugly, at the same time, my fellow House Republicans and I have proposed our own bills focused on increased public safety, restoring parental rights and making our state more affordable.

So far this session, I've introduced HB 6264, which would expand the statute of limitations for crimes against the elderly. SB 280, which I co-introduced with Rep. Anne Dauphinais and Sen. Rob Sampson, would keep political bias out of the classroom and SB 779 would prevent the early release of felons convicted of sex crimes or those offenses involving firearms. Additional bills that we have introduced would require parental notification when children undergo medical procedures.

As ranking member of the Government Administration and Elections Commission, I have voted against the terrible election-related bills that have come before our committee and will continue to do so. My colleagues in the House are also continuing to fight against the outlandish proposals championed by the far left, but the lawmakers who created these bad bills need to hear from the public.

If you feel strongly about any of this proposed legislation, you can call and write letters to the lawmakers who introduced them to let them know how you feel. 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More Government Will Never Be the Answer

roposed bills being raised in Hartford by Majority lawmakers continue to undermine the very underpinnings and essence of America's greatness. There are several clear themes this session that hold the hallmarks of both Marxist and socialist ideologies.

Your individual property rights and

your ability into voluntarily enter into private contracts with other adult free citizens are on the chopping block. As the ranking member of both the legislature's Housing Committee and Labor and Public Employees Committee, I am working daily to prevent a flood of these measures from reaching the Senate floor and becoming law.

Nearly all of us have entered into a rental agreement at some point in our lives. Such agreements are entered into voluntarily and can be negotiated by the parties. The free market sets the value of property, and everyone works to get the best deal they can from their perspective. This how our country has always worked. Far left ideas like price controls have been tried in the past and repeatedly failed and America has thankfully, all but abandoned price controls - until now. The concept of "rent control" is now daily conversation in committee discussions.

Economists across the political spectrum agree that rent control-creating government-imposed caps on what a property owner may charge-will result in fewer housing opportunities for Connecticut families. Housing providers will look for ways to avoid or navigate around artificial market restrictions and will ultimately navigate themselves right out of the state, or simply allow existing units to deteriorate instead of investing in them. Fewer people will invest in providing housing, demand will rise and without the ability to raise prices, the only housing left will be government housing – which may in fact be the ultimate goal. There are other bills too - to ignore local zoning and empower big city housing authorities to expand into small towns. The future of quality, affordable housing is in grave danger as long as big-government central planners are in charge.

It has now become common for our state government to step into a private contracts to unlevel the playing field in favor of one party over another. While this is often depicted as the government 'sticking up for the little guy' - by favoring a renter or an employee or other "group", it is ultimately the renter or employee who suffers most. Providers and job creators are disincentivized to invest in their existing property or businesses that would create new opportunities, ultimately hurting our economy and limiting outcomes.

The engine that drives America and has resulted in our unsurpassed quality of life is the individual freedom to pursue a better future. As the government grows and interferes in our choices, so does our chance for success.

Consider the following measures. Government mandates on employers to: preventing on-call shift scheduling - even in businesses that operate that way naturally, requiring employers to pay for the benefits of striking employees, providing unemployment to striking workers, preventing exclusivity and non-compete agreements in contracts that benefit both parties, even preventing employers from offering job training and education in exchange for requiring the employee to stay on the job for a period of time.

Here again, these concepts have the appearance of the government 'standing up' for the employee against the unfair employer. Appearances can be deceiving. Measures such as these undermine our freedom to make our own way, negotiate our own terms and they ultimately destroy opportunity.

It's clear that these types of laws nurture division and strife een classes and even neighbors. It also doesn't take much hard thinking to realize that any potential short term benefit to one party will ultimately hurt everyone far more in the long run.

Of course, factions have always existed. That is natural and even key to recognizing the benefits of freedom. However, a key part of our system is that it was designed to prevent our government from interfering and empowering any specific groups through limiting the scope of government and building protections into our constitution. Sadly, those limitations are now casually and commonly ignored.

Our system works best when employers and employees are partners and not adversaries. When the government gets in the position of being the decider of who wins and who loses, our freedoms are reduced, ambition is limited, and outcomes are diminished.

Worse, the far left has now graduated from exploiting existing divisions to creating new ones, all again for political gain. It's distasteful, it's dangerous, and it's tearing at the fabric of our country.

Someone recently said, "this is not your father's Democratic party." It's true. JFK would hardly recognize the modern Democratic party on economic views, let alone social issues. The last few moderate Democrat lawmakers in our state government were already on their way out just as I was first elected in 2010. Nowadays, elected Democrats at the state and federal level are more radical and progressive than ever.

This path of division and exploitation of "groups" is destroying our country. We must all work together to restore our political system so it honors our values, our history, and the many that have sacrificed so much for us so we may live free.







Sage Scholars Program

uring the 2021-2022 school year, I offered scholarships ranging from \$8,500 for eleventh grade students, increasing by \$1,000 per year, up to \$24,500 for newborn children in the school year.

Parents of 108 children (4% of an estimated 2,700 children resident in Wolcott) registered their children for \$1.5 million dollars in free college tuition credits that can be redeemed by students accepted by and enrolling in any of 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars.

For the current 2022-2023 school year, Wolcott children in grades 9, 10, 11, may be registered by their parents in a new FasTrak program offered by Sage Scholars if they did not previously enroll in a Sage Scholars program. Registration is free.

When students are in grade 11, they can complete a questionnaire about their academic and avocational achievement, and college interests, Such data is entered into a database and offered to the 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars. Any of those universities may mail information on their school to any student they find interesting to them.

Participants in the FasTrak program can accumulate 13,500 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 11, or 19,000 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 10, or 24,000 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 9. Each tuition reward point may be converted into \$1 of tuition credits if a student enters any of the 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars.

Many of these universities are now making "Pre-Admission" offers to students. They may offer to accept a student upon verification of the information in the student's questionnaire, and receipt of an application from the student. Such offers can come in either grade 11 or grade 12. This reverses the current process of a student recruiting colleges in grade 12, and under FasTrak colleges may make "Pre-Admission" offers to students as early as 11th grade.

Parents of eligible students must enroll their children directly with Sage Scholars. The Wolcott Board of Education does not allow scholarships to be offered to Wolcott students by individuals or by business corporations, only by 501{c}3 charities, and will not vote to change their policy.

If your child is not already registered with Sage Scholars, you may register your child by (1) go to www.tuitionrewards.com/quickstart; (2) enter the program code "Chess"; and (3) follow the instructions.







Wolcott Historical Society - March 2023



This month I will conclude my series on aviation history in our town; a topic, which has proven to be interesting to all. When I began this research, I was unaware of the number of incidents that I would uncover, but

so many readers were willing to share information and I found more as I perused old newspapers. Although I wrote about this topic back in 2017 many readers either missed them or forgot about them so I'm glad I revisited them.

MacCormack Drive got its name from William MacCormack who settled in Wolcott in the late 1800s and operated a cider mill on the Mad River behind where Rite Aid is located today. "Bill" as locals called him eventually acquired a large parcel of land near Rite Aid and across Wolcott Road, to Potuccos Ring Road to Lyman Road and down to Chestnut Hill Reservoir. The pasturelands and apple orchards on his property were reasonably flat and he thought they would be ideal for an airport. This idea was considered by the state in 1923, but then the Mt. Tobe site in Plymouth was selected instead. About ten years later in May of 1932 the State aviation department accepted MacCormack's field as an emergency landing strip, stating that mail planes flew directly over his property. To seal the deal, the town was required to discontinue an old road leading from Chestnut Hill Road to what was known as Kenney Road at a point close to the field, which they did, and Bill MacCormack's vision of an airstrip became a reality. I do not know if any planes ever landed on the airstrip, nor do I know where Kenney Road was located.



This land owned by the MacCormack family was first looked at as an airport in 1923 but was not approved. Years later, in 1932 it was approved as an emergency landing strip for mail planes flying over.

In the late 1950s or early 1960s a small plane was forced to land in a field on Bound Line Road just across the street from the newly built Wolcott High School. Simon Gagne owned this flat, expansive piece of farmland. It was here that Paul. M. Wood was forced to land his small plane. He was headed for New London from Syracuse, NY, when a dense fog covered the area and he had to land on Gagnon's property. The aircraft was able to land safely without any damage to plane or pilot, but authorities doubted that it would be able to take off in such a short space. To their



surprise, the pilot taxied the plane over to the high school. These fields originally called Pritchard's fields were very flat and long; this allowed the pilot to take off safely because the high school building was much smaller then and the football and track fields were not built at the time. Art Gagnon re-

membered this event



The WHS (Career and Technical Education) Advisory Council is composed of CTE teachers and community members representing different career pathways. The mission of the WHS CTE Advisory Council is to advise, assist, support, and advocate for the career and technical education program at Wolcott High School. This is accomplished by:

- Ensuring pathways are available for students to explore various career opportunities thereby understanding the realities of the workforce.
- Collaborating with CTE faculty to prepare students with college and career ready skills and experiences needed to succeed in a global economy.

The CTE Advisory Council is seeking community members for the 2022-2023 school year. Wolcott residents or business owners who are employed in the Culinary, Early Childhood Education, Photography/Video Production, and Hospitality/Tourism fields.

The council meets two times a year from 2-2:45PM at Wolcott High School. Community members of the council work with CTE teachers to review course offerings and teaching practices to ensure alignment with the realities of the workplace. They help select and induct members of the WHS chapter of the National Technical Honor Society. They also help to create programs and opportunities for students to explore career pathways and develop career readiness skills. 
