

After 27 years, Funeral Director Marc L. Frigon returns to Woodtick Memorial



"Let's Go GOP, CT Dems Are Making It Easy For Ya!

As a traditional Republican, I am often frustrated by my party when it fails to stand strong in the face of Democrat policies to increase taxes, wasteful spending, and overzealous, damaging regulatory policy. Though they are flat wrong on most things, I am forced to admire the Democrats for almost never wavering on their agenda.

It's an odd situation because I am certain, down to my bones, that Republicans are right on the issues and if they proclaimed their views boldly on everything from economic freedom to civil rights, even social issues, we would end up on the winning side far more often.

The Democrats on the other hand, continue to embrace somethings I would describe as madness – but they do so with unparalleled confidence. This is the party that has gone full socialism. I remember when they were afraid of the word! Not anymore. They are successfully selling the most destructive worldview in human history to Americans! We cannot let that continue!

Here in Connecticut, Republicans are faced with an extraordinary opportunity. Our Connecticut Democrat counterparts are among the most daring in the country. They are embracing more outlandish policy positions than ever – things remarkably few people agree with.

First on the list is the Democrats repeated efforts to undermine the rule of law, minimize the role and value of police officers, and gut our criminal justice system. All the while claiming victory for reducing the prison population - and falsely, repeatedly, stating that crime is down.

Anyone with eyes and ears can see that crime is at historic highs. Violent acts once considered out-of-the-ordinary are now commonplace, and quickly forgotten in the daily news cycle of shootings, thefts, and violence across the state. Last month, six criminals—mostly juveniles—went on a two-day crime spree in multiple towns including an armed robbery in Southington. Crime is rising and Connecticut residents are paying the price.

This problem is the direct result of a decade of bad criminal justice policies (passed on party lines) that remove

consequences for criminal behavior. Democrats have heralded programs that release violent offenders from prison ahead of schedule, raising the age in which a juvenile may be tried as an adult, eliminating consent searches for criminal suspects, preventing police chases, and even removing liability protections for police officers.

Just this year, they advanced a law that enables a violent offender to receive parole if they committed the crime before age 21.

We all know that letting criminals out early or erasing convictions will not make this state safer. Police chiefs and those in public safety in the state have detailed, time and time again, that the perpetrators of these crimes have long criminal histories. Rather than admit failure, and reverse course, Connecticut democrats will use creative statistics support their claims that crime is not a problem, or that their policies are working. Reasonable people know this to be disingenuous at best.

Despite the failure of the Majority Democrat's policies on crime, and the decades of damage done to our state's affordability and competitiveness, they appear ready to double-down on unpopular policies.

Recently, the Governor, by way of his unelected commissioner of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) has pushed us to the brink of a complete ban on the sale of gas-powered vehicles by 2035. This has been a calculated, slow process done through legislative tricks over the years to cede your voice in this matter to unelected progressive bureaucrats. This is all set to happen through the regulatory process and without any legislative debate!

In short, our state leaders are anchoring us to California emissions standards, a state 3,000 miles away which bases much of its policy on virtue signaling and not science. The debate over CO2, and climate change itself, is far from settled. A massive transition to electric vehicles is well beyond the capability of our electrical grid, and importantly, what benefit are electrical vehicles if they are charged by electricity produced almost exclusively by natural gas?

Further, what benefit is there without the rest of the country, or the rest of the world, participating in the conversion? Are Connecticut residents required to give up their freedom to choose a gas-powered vehicle so Governor Lamont can look like a hero to the woke before real science movement?

I have consistently fought against measures like this since joining the legislature. The drawbacks and folly in this plan are many--too many to explore in this short space. At the heart of it lies this: progressive democrats have silenced your voice through this process, ignoring all practicality, and embracing a radical agenda based on unsettled science.

Speaking of ignoring science, the battle over bathrooms and pronouns continues across the country. As a staunch advocate for civil liberties, I personally don't care how others live or express themselves. That is their God-given right, though I share the opinion of many that the volume of alternative choices being pushed by America's entertainment and advertising industries is excessive. The overwhelming pushback on Bud Light and Target is instructive. The message is clear. Most Americans can appreciate personal choice and even things they don't personally agree with - but don't force it on them!

More importantly, don't involve the kids. Here again, Connecticut Democrats choose to fly in the face of the overwhelming majority, passing legislation to place women's hygiene products in boys' bathrooms in grades 3-12! Some have criticized parents who rightfully want to make sure there is age-appropriate content in libraries and classrooms to banning books. That's quite a stretch.

Most recently, there has been debate and legal maneuvering about whether parents have a right to know about what's happening with their own children in school, particularly when the child is experiencing confusion over gender or sexuality. According to a July story from the CT News Junkie, "Connecticut Attorney General William Tong was among attorneys general in 16 states last week who defended school officials in Ludlow, Massachusetts, who have been sued for not notifying parents that their two children were using new names and personal pronouns at school."

I am betting that not only is that the wrong side of that issue, but it's also a pretty unpopular one too.

So here we go Republicans, Connecticut's elected Democrats are illustrating just how far out of touch they are. Connecticut's Attempt to Ban Your Gas-Powered Vehicle

Regulatory changes are on the horizon that will impact all of us, from daily commuters who need their cars to get to work or drop off their kids, to business owners

who need to make deliveries or carry out jobs for clients.

What I am referring to is Connecticut's attempt to force you to buy an electric vehicle whether you like it or not.

The state's Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) is considering two proposed regulations, one that would ban the sales of new gas-powered passenger cars (beginning in 2035) and another that would gradually prohibit the sale of new gas-powered trucks that are used to ship goods and provide essential services.

We already live in one of the nation's most energy-expensive states. Now, on top of that, Democrats are dictating what vehicle you can buy. These electric vehicles are far more expensive than their gas-powered equivalents, but Democrats just do not seem to care that most people cannot afford them.

A simple search of prices for electric vehicles shows that a base-model Tesla costs about \$40,000, while a base-model electric Ford pickup truck costs \$50,000. And other makes and models cost well over \$100,000. Does that sound affordable for most people?

So instead of having the choice to buy an affordable gas-powered car, Democrats through Governor Lamont,

are limiting consumers to more expensive options that many families will be unable to afford. There are also many hidden costs in addition to the cost of the vehicle. Electrical chargers need to be installed in homes and at places of work, while additions to home wiring may be needed, tacking on thousands for consumers.

Mandates such as these ignore the budgets of families that are already struggling with inflation in their everyday lives. It is that ivory tower thinking that shows the disconnect between officials in Hartford and the residents of Connecticut.


And how much better are these cars for the environment? The energy to charge them must come from somewhere, which means an increased strain on our electric system; there is simply no guarantee that our grid is ready. Electricity is already incredibly expensive in our state and our bills will dramatically spike with the implementation of these mandates.

How exactly are construction vehicles supposed to operate at job sites and similar situations? Are companies supposed to buy gas-powered generators so they can charge their electric vehicles at the work sites? It is just substituting one problem for another.

And electric vehicles require a limited resource to power their batteries: lithium. Transitioning to electric vehicles in the United States will require three times as much lithium than we have now, according to a report published earlier this year. That means more mining is needed, which will cause water shortages and ecosystem destruction in other parts of the world, that same research stated. Again, it is just replacing one problem with another.

The bottom-line question is this: why is government getting involved in a decision that should be left to consumers? It is yet another overreach by Connecticut officials who are doing all they can to turn the state into California. 

Scholarships for Wolcott Grade 9-11 Students

For the new 2023-2024 school year, Wolcott High School students in grades 9, 10, 11, may be registered by their parents in a new Quick Stsrt program offered by Sage Scholars if they did not previously enroll in a Sage Scholars program. Registration is free.

When students are in grade 11, they can complete a questionnaire about their academics, personal achievements, and college interests. Such data is entered into a database and offered to the 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars. Any of those universities may mail information on their school to any student they find interesting to them.

Participants in the Quick Start program can accumulate 13,500 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 11, or 19,000 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 10, or 24,000 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 9. Each tuition reward point may be converted into \$1 of tuition credits if a student enters any of the 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars.

70 of the 460 universities are now making "Pre-Admission" offers to students. They may offer to accept a student upon verification of the information in the student's questionnaire, and receipt of an application from the student. Such offers can come in either grade 11 or grade 12. This reverses the current process of a student recruiting colleges in grade 12, and under Quick Start colleges may make "Pre-Admission" offers to students as early as 11th grade.

Parents of eligible students must enroll their children directly with Sage Scholars. The Wolcott Board of Education does not allow scholarships to be offered to Wolcott students by individuals or by business corporations, only by 501 {c}3 charities, and will not vote to change their policy.

If your child is not already registered with Sage Scholars, you may register your child by (1) go to www.tuitionrewards.com/quickstart; (2) enter the program code "Chess"; and (3) follow the instructions.

We added a little free library and clothing collection shed. We planted a community garden and delicious apple trees. We held paint nights, fairy garden building, and cupcake decorating classes.

Wolcott Historical Society - September 2023

I'd like to start this month's article with an interesting quote from Samuel Orcutt's book, "History of the Town of Wolcott (Connecticut) From 1731 to 1874." I think it helps us to understand why these early settlers trudged up the hills of Wolcott

and its surroundings to establish their homesteads.

"In the settlement of Connecticut, and other New England States, the settlers made their homes first in the valleys and along the rivers and streams of water. After fifty to seventy years' experience of decimation from fevers and sickness, caused by the fogs and malaria in those lowlands, they began to climb the hills and mountains, and to make their homes where the sun rose before ten o'clock in the morning, and set after four o'clock in the afternoon; so the first settlers came into Wolcott, upon the hills, fifty-seven years after the settlement of Waterbury, and ninety-one years after the settlement of Farmington." These settlers traveled on Native




Post card of Center Street to the Green. Benson's Hill started at the falls on the Mad River, across from where Pat's IGA is today and led to the Center of town.

American trails or paths from Farmington to Mattatuck, now Waterbury. The trail they traveled lay across the northwest corner of Wolcott and was probably the first road in our town, known as Spindle Hill Road. Even today as you travel this road it can be challenging; just imagine what it looked like over 250 years ago. As I have stated in many of my articles, the stamina and fortitude of these early settlers was amazing.

A great community knows its history! Our town has a wealth of rich history that started well over 250 years ago when several sturdy pioneers and their families ventured into its boundaries. John Alcott settled on Spindle Hill, Thomas Upson came up Southington Mountain and settled in the Hitchcock Lake area, Ebenezer Wakelee settled in the southwestern section in the Big Plains area near what is now Sharon Road, and Jacob Benson was believed to be the first settler in what is now the center of town known as Benson's Hill; receiving the name because he was the first to reside there. Benson's Hill started at the falls on the Mad River, across from where Pat's IGA is today and led to the Center of town. Benson operated a grist mill at the falls and kept a store at that Center on the hill. Benjamin Harrison later came from Branford and purchased 111 acres of land with a house and barn on the easterly side of Benson's Hill. These first settlers set the stage for those who followed and through their strength set the groundwork for our present-day town.



The first Ecclesiastical Society meeting took place on November 13, 1770, at the home of Mr. Joseph Atkins. Although the house is no longer standing it was located west of the present church. (This house should not be confused with another historic house located at 49 Center Street, the Josiah Atkins House (circa 1777). This house was originally owned by Lt. Josiah Rogers, who was not only in the Farmingbury Militia, but a founder in both the Farmingbury Society and its Parish.)The rules of this meeting carefully followed Colonial Law granted through the General Assembly and Courts. This grant formed the parish from the towns of Waterbury and Farmington and gave it the name Farmingbury. This meeting was important because it allowed residents to vote in the leaders that would guide the Society to procure a preacher, set a tax rate to raise money, set up a school committee and districts in the settlement and most importantly to build a meeting house. It was Joseph Atkins who was chosen to stick the stake for the meeting house. He not only served on the committee to build a meeting house but gave two acres of land for that purpose on the Bound Line Highway. Construction on the church did not start until April 1973.

It wasn't until November 18, 1773, that 30 members of the Farmingbury Parish signed the "Covenant of Confederation" that gave birth to the first Parish Church and Meeting House in our town. That first church stood facing south and the Green as well as on the line that divided the towns from which the parish was formed; half in Waterbury and half in Farmington. I have included an excellent sketch researched and drawn by John H. Washburne many years ago that shows exactly where that first church stood. I thought it was interesting that the church was placed exactly half in Waterbury and half in Farmington. If the structure was still standing today part of it would have sat on Center Street. It was a plain building without a steeple. The pulpit stood on the north side, opposite the front door with a double window above it. The custom in those days was for the pulpit to be built high and in front, and below it the seats for the deacons were placed. The front galleries extended around three sides with raised seats behind. The pews were designed like an old-fashioned box with numbers on the doors and members

were seated according to their age, the elderly nearest the pulpit. At the south end between the stairways were high seats for young people who preferred them. There were also two other doors at each end of the church facing east and west. One might visualize a cross the way the pulpit, windows and doors were placed in the building. Remember, the Church rule was the law of the land in those days. The body of the church was painted white, and the roof red. Reverend Alexander Gillet was officially ordained the first preacher on December 29th of that year. This first church stood on Benson's Hill until December 11, 1839, when it was destroyed by fire. That original church is no longer standing, but the one that replaced it stands majestically on our Green today as a symbol of the strength of those forefathers who came before us.





So as our Congregational Church and town celebrate this the 250th milestone on September 8th, 9th and 10th try to remember the sacrifices, hard work and strength it took to survive during those colonial times. All are welcome to join in on this weekend celebration. There will be a variety of activities on the Green and surroundings for everyone to enjoy. The Wolcott Historical Society will have its Center School History Museum open on Saturday from noon to 4:00 and on Sunday from noon to 2:00. We hope to see you there!!



School Lunch Prices 2023-2024

Welcome back to the 2023-2024 school year! This year, breakfast and lunch will go back to pricing based on eligibility of free, reduced, and paid.

We strongly encourage you to fill out the 2023-2024 Free and Reduced Application. Both the paper application and the online application is available on the Wolcott Public Schools website, under Departments – Food Services. The Free and Reduced Application, if qualified, signifies more than just free and reduced priced meals. It qualifies households for fee waivers for college applications, discount fees for standardized testing, and possible utility bill discounts.

Some children may be directly certified for free or reducedprice meals based on Medicaid (HUSKY). No application is required if the district directly certifies a child based on Medicaid (HUSKY). All children in these households are eligible for free or reduced-priced meal benefits.


