



Don't California My Connecticut!

onnecticut has little in common with California, other than increasingly progressive leadership, and the resulting damage to our economies and civil rights. California has approximately ten times the population of our "Nutmeg State." Our geographic area is roughly a mere three percent of California's,

and of course, we are separated by 3,000 miles on opposite coasts of North America. Yet, we are tied by an invisible thread of government policy dictating the behavior of Connecticut residents.

The Federal Government requires states to either adopt the emission standards set by the Department of Environmental Protection or the California emission standards. In 2004, Connecticut passed Public Act 04-84 which required the commissioner of the then DEP to adopt the California standards for light duty vehicles. Surprisingly, members of both parties voted in favor of such nonsense overwhelmingly. While there were several no votes during the committee process the bill passed the Senate 36-0 and the House 143-1 with only my friend, Rep. John Piscopo (R) being the lone (and correct) no vote.

Until recently, our law only required us to adopt the light duty standards, this changed in 2022. PA 22-25 An Act Concerning the Connecticut Clean Air Act, allowed, but did not require, DEEP to adopt the emission standards for both medium and heavy-duty vehicles. Ironically, this time, only one Republican voted in favor. That's something, I guess.

Now, the Lamont administration is attempting to use its executive and regulatory authority via the Dept. of Energy and Environmental Protection to create an even fartherreaching mandate preventing the purchase of new gasolinepowered cars starting in 2035. Similar mandates on light, medium, and heavy-duty trucks will also be phasedin beginning in model year 2027.

This is unacceptable. We live in a free nation that guarantees our citizens the freedom of choice and expression. Those freedoms extend to your consumer purchases. Our government does not have the right to force citizens to buy one product over another.

These same freedoms should also extend to automakers that will now be forced to overhaul their entire product line in the span of 12 years. It is market forces that should drive an automaker's vehicle lineup. If you, as consumers, find so-called "eco-friendly" vehicles to be appealing, then automakers will adjust accordingly.

Consumers, automakers, repair shops, and fuel stations should not be subject to extreme government force and coercion. Personal choice and freedom in the marketplace must be protected. This imperative is especially true when there is a lack of any compelling argument whatsoever to begin outlawing gasoline-powered vehicles. The case for global climate change being the direct result of manmade CO2 emissions is not the least bit conclusive with scientists on all sides of the argument. Some even suggest that CO2 levels were at dangerously low levels until recently, potentially preventing photosynthesis, killing plant life and eventually everything, and that manmade CO2 might have even helped.

That debate should continue based only in legitimate science. For our purposes, the argument over climate change is moot since the banning of gas-powered autos and trucks in favor of electric vehicles does not reduce the amount of so called "fossil fuels" in use or CO2 emissions. Our electric grid relies almost entirely upon natural gas. This is the true source of the electricity that would be used to charge and recharge the batteries in electric vehicles. Until our electric grid is powered by something other than natural gas, the push for electric vehicles is unnecessary, and obviously based solely in politics and hysteria.

More importantly, one small US state making such a commitment is as implausible as it is pointless. Without a worldwide commitment and effort, there is zero attainable benefit to our environment through this policy agenda.

The average EV costs more than \$53,000 according to Kelly Blue Book. Wouldn't it be great if Connecticut's economy was booming, and we all could afford brand new EV's? Prices will likely climb by year 2035. The result will be fewer newer vehicles being purchased. People will choose to retain their older, less efficient gas-powered vehicles longer. Remarkably, this is another result in direct contradiction of the EV initiative's stated goals.

We must also consider the environmental and humanitarian impact of EVs in terms of their production and recycling. The materials used come from ecologically-questionable cobalt-mining in third-world countries by unfriendly and even adversarial — nations with egregious environmental and human rights records. Countless news stories have been published itemizing the damage to the environment, as well as the human suffering that is already underway to satisfy the demand for lithium batteries. The batteries themselves also raise concerns. They have proven to be dangerous in terms of potential fires and the inability to be recycled in an environmentally conscious manner.

Finally, the Left has omitted a key detail in this entire conversation: Connecticut's electric grid simply cannot handle the increase in electric usage that will be needed to power EVs. We already pay some of the highest premiums for electricity in the nation. Our electric grid, energy production, and overall infrastructure will need to be dramatically overhauled – and in just 10 to 12 years. This is not nearly enough time to accomplish this monumental task.

Possibly worse than the mandate itself, is that the Governor is attempting to circumvent the legislature in the process. The people's elected representatives must be allowed to weigh-in during future discussions so that we may cooperatively find ways to make our state more economically and environmentally friendly in a safe and responsible manner.

How long will Connecticut's residents put up with government that puts virtue signaling ahead of reason and good policy? Not long is my prediction and my hope. As always, you can find me at www.senatorsampson.com and on social media@sampsonforct.





Mosquitoes Thriving Due to Increase in Temperatures and Milder Winters

Residents urged to protect themselves



This summer has been very humid and rainy, producing the perfect conditions for mosquitoes to flourish. Although most mosquitoes are not harmful and are just a nuisance, there are approximately 12 species of mosquitoes

that can carry diseases including West Nile virus, Zika, and in rare cases, Malaria.

The Chesprocott Health District is urging residents to take the following precautions to keep mosquitoes under control and prevent contracting a mosquito-borne disease this season.

- Empty all standing water in outdoor containers and fill tree holes that collect water
- Tightly cover all storage containers (rain barrels, buckets, etc.) so mosquitoes cannot lay eggs
- If you have a septic tank, repair cracks or gaps. Cover open vent or plumbing pipes. Use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.
- Repair any holes in window screens to prevent mosquitoes from coming into the house
- Keep doors closed and avoid propping doors open
- When possible, wear clothing with long sleeves, pants, skirts and long dresses as well as wear socks and shoes to stop mosquitoes biting your skin.
- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) registered insect repellent with one of the following ingredients (DEET, Picaridin (known as KBR 3023, IR3535, Oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE), Para-menthane-diol (PMD), or 2-undecanone)

Scholarships for Wolcott Grade 9-11 Students

For the new 2023-2024 school year, Wolcott High School students in grades 9, 10, 11, may be registered by their parents in a new Quick Stsrt program offered by Sage Scholars if they did not previously enroll in a Sage Scholars program. Registration is free.

When students are in grade 11, they can complete a questionnaire about their academics, personal achievements, and college interests. Such data is entered into a database and offered to the 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars. Any of those universities may mail information on their school to any student they find interesting to them.

Participants in the Quick Start program can accumulate 13,500 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 11, or 19,000 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 10, or 24,000 tuition reward points if they enroll in grade 9. Each tuition reward point may be converted into \$1 of tuition credits if a student enters any of the 460 private universities comprising Sage Scholars.

70 of the 460 universities are now making "Pre-Admission" offers to students. They may offer to accept a student upon verification of the information in the student's questionnaire, and receipt of an application from the student. Such offers can come in either grade 11 or grade 12. This reverses the current process of a student recruiting colleges in grade 12, and under Quick Start colleges may make "Pre-Admission" offers to students as early as 11th grade.

Parents of eligible students must enroll their children directly with Sage Scholars. The Wolcott Board of Education does not allow scholarships to be offered to Wolcott students by individuals or by business corporations, only by 501 {c}3 charities, and will not vote to change their policy.

If your child is not already registered with Sage Scholars, you may register your child by (1) go to www.tuition rewards.com/quickstart; (2) enter the program code "Chess"; and (3) follow the instructions. *— Frederick Townsend, Wolcott*

A Broken System **State Representative Gale Mastrofrancesco** Representing Wolcott & Southington

hen it comes to protecting our children, the government bears responsibility for keeping the most vulnerable of them safe, especially those who are in the care of the Department of

Children and Families. But ladies and gentlemen, something is broken with this system.

My Republican colleagues in the House and Senate have called for the Department of Children and Families to explain to the legislature its procedures for placing high-risk juveniles in group homes. In addition, we want to know how contractors who run these facilities are selected.

We have also requested that the legislature's Committee on Children, which has oversight of DCF-related matters, hold an informational hearing about what happened at the Short-Term Assessment & Respite (STAR) Home in Harwinton as well as the process used to secure vendors such as Bridge Family Center.

Why are we calling for this? The CT Inside Investigator published a report in recent weeks detailing horrific allegations about conditions inside the STAR Home, which is operated by the nonprofit Bridge Family Center. The home is one of four emergency shelters in the state operated by Bridge, housing girls with behavioral and mental health problems who are in DCF custody after being removed from the care of their families.

The allegations are sickening. Multiple staff members were accused in documentation of physically and sexually assaulting the girls in the home, one who was only 14 years old. Meanwhile, the residents of the home were running amuck, assaulting staff members, barricading themselves in the facility and attacking state troopers who responded to help.

The girls in the home - ranging from 14 to 18 also sneaked out of the facility, stole cars and committed burglaries in town, among other allegations included in the report. And this didn't just happen once or twice, the police and first responders were called to the home "hundreds" of times in two years! Did DCF launch a full investigation and shut the home down in response? No!

It is absolutely outrageous. How could this have gone unnoticed by the higher ups at DCF? Did they just ignore the problem?

One local official in Harwinton went so far as to call it a crisis because during a large brawl at the home, all of the town's ambulances were tied up, leaving none for residents who were experiencing an emergency elsewhere in town. And there were allegations that staff were told not to call police, but instead consult with supervisors when things got out of control.

My concern is not just for this one particular home, it is for all the other facilities under DCF oversight and the contractors it hires to run them. How do we know what is going on inside these homes? Are there logs of police calls, staff reports, or other metrics we, as lawmakers, can see to evaluate the effectiveness of these programs? Do these homes track the progress of their residents to ensure they are getting the help they need?

These are basic questions, which is why we are calling for hearings to get to the bottom of it and demand accountability for the people in charge. Millions of tax dollars are being spent on these facilities and we want accountability not only for the girls who are placed there, but also the residents in the surrounding area. Their safety is at risk and I am concerned about other towns as well.

We expect that when our tax dollars are used, they are used responsibly, especially when those funds are supposed to be used to keep our youngest safe. But I fear that this one home in Harwinton, is just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to statewide problems with these facilities.





Wolcott Historical Society - October 2023

s I have stated in so many of my previous articles, our town, whether we are discussing Farmingbury Parish or Wolcott, has a rich and interesting history that started over 250 years ago. In 2021 Wolcott celebrated 225

years of its incorporation and last month the Congregational Church celebrated 250 years on "Benson's Hill." As I stood on the Green enjoying the festivities during that celebration, I couldn't help but notice the 1923 date on our Town Hall. That is another building that should be remembered and celebrated because it has been standing on Benson's Hill for 100 years.

This month, I'd like to revisit the history of our Town Hall that started out looking much differently than what you see today. In Colonial times there was no separation of church and state, therefore town meetings were held at the Congregational Parish until 1839 when that original church structure was destroyed by fire. After the destruction of the Church, town meetings were held outside on the Green until 1856. In that year the town selectmen purchased an old store located on the south side of the Green from Anson H. Smith for the sum on \$350. That building became the first town hall and was referred to as "Old Town Hall." It was used for government and social activities for seventy years. The Wolcott Drum Band, today known as the Mattatuck Drum Band and the Grange used the upstairs of the building for their weekly meetings. Later the Grange purchased the building next door and no longer needed the use of the Town Hall.

In 1923 the "Old Town Hall" was replaced with a new brick structure. It was a two and a half story Federal Revivalstyle building featuring a gable-to-street roof and a trap rock foundation. This new structure continued to be used for town offices, town meetings and graduations for the district elementary schools. In 1924 the town library was moved from the Beecher Memorial, which was next to the Congregational Church to the Town Hall. It was housed in

a room off the entryway, and it remained there until 1957 when it was moved into the basement of the Center School building because of renovations to the Town Hall. During the years from 1957 to 1959 several town offices were relocated to the Center School building. At some point, a vault room was added to the Center School to house town records for the Town Clerk.

In 1987 a State of Connecticut inspection of Town Hall revealed that vaults in several offices were no longer large enough to safely store and preserve public records and that the town was in violation of state statutes. Thus, the town was required to bring the building into full compliance with the law. On September 8, 1989, the groundbreaking for the new building took place and seventeen months later what emerged was a beautiful new structure, BUT that original 1923 building remained a part of it. The new addition/renovations added 9,300 square feet of new space to the 5,700 square foot old space. We now had a Town Hall that met State requirements as well as expanded working space in every department. Even though the present Town Hall building still houses the original 1923 structure, if the date was not posted on that old section of the building, you might not even notice it.

So, the next time you drive by our Town Hall look to the far-right side and look up and you will see "1923" at the top of the gable. Happy 100th Birthday to our "Old Town Hall"
