## Bills of the Wild Wild Left, 2024 Edition

**T** ach session, there are hundreds of bills introduced in Hartford, and you would not believe some of the ideas that extreme members of the legislature dream up.

Decriminalizing the possession

of hallucinogenic mushrooms? Giving illegal immigrants taxpayer-funded health insurance? Mandating that you drive an electric vehicle? Stopping landlords from evicting people? Erasing women from state statutes?

These are not just ideas; they are the many bad bills that have actually been introduced by members of the Democrat majority. These bills are aimed at pushing an extreme progressive agenda, while ignoring average taxpayers, women and property owners, among many others.

These are just a few of the pieces of legislation proposed this 2024 session (and there are many more):

HB 5324 - Makes Connecticut less safe by restricting the state's police officers from stopping drivers for violations, including taillight and headlamp infractions, license plate infractions, registration infractions and tinted windows. Police often use these violations as a way of establishing probable cause to pull over a vehicle and begin an investigation into a more serious crime.

HB 5297 – Decriminalizes psilocybin (aka Magic Mushrooms) in amounts of less than a half ounce

HB 5485 - Creates a "roadmap" that steers Connecticut to a mandate that forces residents to purchase an electric vehicle and could end with Connecticut using California's radical emissions standards

HB 5166 - Mandates employers to include sick days for employees, no matter the size of the company or the cost involved, yet another unfunded mandate inflicted on our business community.



HB 5164 - Allows striking employees to access unemployment benefits after a period of two consecutive weeks of striking.

SB 207 - Allows a housing authority to expand jurisdiction to include other towns and cities. Allows them to purchase 'affordable' housing units in the state. This bill would allow the housing authority to use the affordable housing appeals process to circumvent local zoning approval and build affordable housing in a town that rejected it.

HB 5242 - Restricts a landlord's ability to deny a prospective tenant's rental application based on a prior felony conviction by creating a process to appeal application denials. Denial of an application based on misdemeanor convictions would be barred, making it nearly impossible for a landlord to deny criminals from moving into their properties.

SB 143 - This bill from legislative Democrats would flip the landlord-tenant relationship on its head by establishing a general right for a tenant to remain in a rental unit after the tenant's lease expires.

HB 5057 - Removes a section of statute that states "drive-only" driver's licenses must indicate on the back that they are not meant to be used for voting. These licenses were originally designed to say "drive-only" and were given out to illegal aliens and other people and there are serious concerns the legislation will increase voting fraud.

SB 414 - Would create an additional layer of bureaucracy and cost to taxpayers by directing all state offices to hire Diversity, Equity and Inclusion directors.

HB 5416 - Reduces the number of crisis response drills conducted in Connecticut schools, making our children less prepared should tragedy strike.

SB 125 - The bill language erases "expectant mother" and replaces it with "pregnant person," and "his or her" is removed and replaced with "such alleged genetic parent's child." The word "women" is replaced with "pregnant parents."

HB 5371 - Bill requires the Department of Social Services to study the costs and benefits of expanding HUSKY Health benefits to all uninsured state residents under the age of 19, regardless of income or immigration status, effectively providing illegal immigrants with taxpayer-funded health insurance. The cost to taxpayers would be enormous.

And while there are the bad bills, my fellow Republicans and I have proposed our own legislation, such as SB 390, which calls for a mandatory one-year prison sentence for anyone that violates Connecticut's election laws. As the recent voting scandal in Bridgeport has shown, bad actors will continue to commit fraud in our elections unless they understand that they will face consequences.

Members of our military who fought overseas in Vietnam deserve our gratitude, which is why I, along with State Senator Rob Sampson and State Representative Anne Dauphinais, have requested a resolution that would honor veterans of the Vietnam War who were exposed to Agent Orange.

SJ 6 would recognize our brave veterans who fought overseas and were exposed to the effects the carcinogenic chemical.

My colleagues in the House are also continuing to fight against the outrageous bills of the far left, but the lawmakers who created this legislation need to hear from the public.

### **Have Your** A/C Maintenance Done Now! It's that Time of the year again!!! SPRING!

What does this mean for your Central Air Conditioning or Mini Split (Ductless) System? It's time for a maintenance! This will ensure your system is running at its peak performance for the hot & humid days ahead.



Just like we maintain our vehicles to keep them running efficiently without breakdown, we do the same for our Air Conditioning system in the spring.

A system that is not properly maintained

may have longer run times thus, using more electricity. The house will not cool properly on the hotter humid days, and you are more likely to have a major break down at the worst possible time (in the dog days of summer). Regular system maintenance should be done on a system that you have had for more than one year.

System maintenance should be done by an HVAC professional as it usually includes more than cleaning. During a typical maintenance the HVAC technician will be able to take measurements and steps to prolong the life of your system, or identify a potential failure by performing some, or all, of these steps depending on the type of equipment:

- Checking for loose wires. Loose connections can cause the wire to overheat and melt the coating possibly causing the system too short to ground, and even cause premature failure of components
- Testing the system capacitor, a weak capacitor can cause the compressor not to start, draw high amperage while trying to start, or burn out the motor. (A compressor replacement is a very expensive repair).
- Test and inspect compressor operation
- Check system pressures and temperatures. They will be looking to see if you have proper levels of refrigerant (the system should never be low unless there is a leak). If the tech finds evidence of leak, your options could be to repair the leak or replace the equipment. Either way, now is the time to deal with that.
- Inspect and clean the outdoor coil HVAC Pros have special equipment and chemicals to safely clean your outdoor unit.
- · Change the air filter
- Blow out the drain line to ensure the condensation will drain properly
- Inspect blower wheel for a tight fit and possible residue build up
- Inspect condenser and the evaporator coil.
- Measure amp draw on all motors to ensure proper performance to prevent a component or system failure.



## Vegetable Planting Guide



hat to plant and when: Connecticut has three different USDA Hardiness Zones, which means vegetables could be planted at different times during the calendar year depending on where the garden is located within the state. Since Connecticut has a shorter growing season, warm-weather crops are still an option but you may want to research newer varieties that can reach their harvest date within a shorter timeframe. Some of the best plants to grow in Connecticut include lettuce, Cole crops like broccoli and Brussels sprouts, greens like spinach and kale, beans, root crops and other cool-season varieties. Some perennial vegetables, like asparagus, do well in northern Connecticut and can provide a yearly harvest.

May: Begin beans, Brussels sprouts, cucumber, corn, squash, and cabbage inside. Plant tomatoes and onions outside.

IAQ (Indoor Air Quality) products. There are some great ways to maintain good air quality in your home. Some products are specifically designed to deal with bacteria and air particulates. (The air we breathe in our homes is 40% more polluted than the air we breathe outside).

They can also propose remedies for adding humidity in the winter and dehumidifying in the summer.

Now is the time for maintenance so you can stay cool all summer long!

#### Wolcott is Zone 6:

April: Plant beets, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, kale, lettuce, peas, and spinach outside. Begin these crops inside in March. Begin tomatoes, peppers, and onions inside now.

#### June: Plant peppers outside.

July: Plant beans, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, corn, cucumber, and squash

outside.

August: Plant beets and broccoli outside. Begin carrots, kale, lettuce, peas, and spinach.

September: Plant carrots, kale, lettuce, peas, and spinach outside

### "CT Not Immune to Democrats' 'Open Door' at Southern Border"

The nationwide conversation on illegal immigration has reached a fever pitch. In addition to the thousands of migrants seeking a better way of life in the U.S., the nation has witnessed the sustained effects of other illegal immigrants who have

entered with nefarious intent. Earlier this year, the nation learned of the murder of an innocent 22-year-old nursing student, Laken Riley, at the hands of an illegal immigrant who was also a known gang member.

The details of the incident were gruesome. Equally repulsive is the fact that Laken Riley's killer, an illegal immigrant, was previously known to federal and local authorities for having unlawfully entered the country. Shockingly, he was then released. Subsequent reports indicate that he was eventually arrested in New York City but was released once again — ultimately going on to take Laken Riley's life in Georgia.

In January, seven illegal immigrants were indicted after viciously attacking NYPD officers in Times Square, yet they were released without bail. New York City had been known as a sanctuary city until Mayor Eric Adams recently made changes to related policies.

Tragically, stories like this have become all too common in the U.S. The Federation for American Immigration Reform's (FAIR) website provides ample evidence of incidents where illegal immigrants have harmed or killed innocent American citizens. It is a situation that should not persist.

I have consistently warned my colleagues and the public that it's not a matter of "if," but rather "when," Connecticut will experience the effects of an unsecured southern border. While some may accuse me of fearmongering, the headlines and trends are clear to reasonable observers. Just last month, the U.S. Department of Defense, under President Biden's administration, acknowledged the likelihood of a mass migration of Haitian nationals due to ongoing unrest in their home country. The pressing question remains: How many of these migrants will have criminal backgrounds?

Despite the flashing red warning lights that should accompany large-scale illegal immigration, progressive states like Connecticut seem to be activating neon welcome signs, inadvertently incentivizing unlawful entry.

The journey began in 2014 with the legislature's passage of "Drive-Only" licenses specifically tailored for illegal immigrants—a bill I consistently opposed and later unsuccessfully fought to repeal. Since then, Connecticut has introduced several other incentives within its laws.

What's even more concerning is that Connecticut Democrats have taken the stance of not only incentivizing

illegal immigrants but also welcoming those with criminal records into our state.

It's time for a balanced approach—one that acknowledges the humanitarian aspects of immigration while safeguarding our communities. We must find common ground to address this complex issue without compromising safety or the rule of law.

In 2019, Connecticut effectively transformed into a "Super Sanctuary State" by expanding the "Trust Act" (PA 19-20). This law prohibits cooperation between state law enforcement and federal immigration authorities. Despite my lengthy debate with colleagues on the Senate floor, Democrats voted along party lines to include these protections for individuals with felony convictions, known gang affiliations (such as MS-13), those on terrorist watch-lists, and even those already subject to final deportation orders. Would a reasonable person on Main Street consider this beneficial for our state or nation?

Fast forward to 2021, when legislative Democrats enacted the infamous "Clean Slate Law." This law quietly adds further insulation for criminal illegal aliens. How? In addition to erasing criminal records, it also reduces the maximum prison sentence for misdemeanors by just one day—from one year to 364 days. Why this seemingly arbitrary change? Because 365 days is the threshold triggering eligibility for deportation. The implications are clear. This policy shields criminals who also happen to be illegal immigrants.

Moreover, progressives in the legislature have thrice extended the age at which illegal immigrant children can access the state's free healthcare program (HUSKY). Initially, it was for children younger than eight, then expanded to age 19, and now they are pushing to extend it to age 25.

Rather than reconsidering these policies considering the escalating national conversation, state agencies — under the direction of Democratic leadership — are doubling down.

In February, I issued a warning to residents and fellow lawmakers regarding the state's Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection (DESPP) reporting an unexpected influx of illegal immigrants across Connecticut. In January, the agency even requested municipalities to identify "Temporary Municipal Locations" (TML) where illegal immigrants could find shelter for up to 24 hours. During this time, a "state migrant response task force" would assess their needs and arrange services such as transportation and housing. Yes, the state is essentially asking towns to be prepared to accommodate potentially busloads of illegal immigrants.

The compassionate intent behind this approach is evident — to care for our fellow humans in need. I wholeheartedly support that sentiment. However, we cannot prioritize this at the expense of our neighbors' safety or the well-being of innocent illegal immigrants who arrived here without criminal intent. Connecticut's policies over the past several years have created an attractive nuisance for criminal illegal immigrants, putting residents at risk. These policies not only invite criminal activity but also contribute to system abuse. Furthermore, they marginalize genuine asylumseekers and other immigrants who seek lawful paths toward achieving the American Dream.

The moment has arrived for municipal government leaders across Connecticut to confront a critical decision. Should they persist in adhering to unconstitutional state statutes that obstruct their compliance with federal immigration law—the true law of the land? Alternatively, can they prioritize the safety of their residents by reestablishing cooperation with federal immigration authorities? Connecticut's state laws, which defy federal supremacy, not only violate constitutional principles, but put American lives at risk. The repercussions of cities refusing to adhere to federal immigration law are evident nationwide, and Connecticut is not immune to similar consequences.

The number one obligation of government is the safety of its citizens. The current policy of this administration is contrary to the safety and welfare of Connecticut residents.

Like any rational American, I am in favor of increasing border security to protect our citizens and ensuring a mechanism to keep out human traffickers, drug dealers, gang members, and terrorists. Simultaneously, we must allow those we have thoroughly screened — and who wish to be contributing members of our society — to become part of and benefit our nation.

Congress needs to put aside petty differences and unscrupulous motivations and get the job done. I urge you to help me make the case here in Connecticut that we residents have had enough of the state's unworkable policy on illegal immigration.

## **Wolcott Historical Society - April 2024**

The Wolcott Historical Society has been fortunate to receive some wonderful new donations for our museums many of which hold beautiful memories for the families who donate them. This month, I'd like to share a little his-


tory about our most recent donation, an old rocking chair that was donated by Roberta Leonard. If only this rocker could talk. It belonged to Roberta's mother, Loretta and was part of Loretta's early childhood memories. Roberta thought it would be a perfect addition to our Stone Schoolhouse Museum on Nichols Road since Loretta spent all her elementary years at this school and graduated from there in 1929.

Loretta was born on May 11, 1916, the oldest of four children. Her family moved to Wolcott in September of that year. She had a sister, Beatrice and two brothers Jesmond and Dante. Loretta's father built their house, which still stands on the lower end of Woodtick Road. That house and twenty-five acres of land is where Loretta grew up. Their beautifully wooded land spanned from Woodtick Road to the end of Finch Road. Her family grew many vegetables on the land, especially greens as well as cultivating wild dandelions on the property. She was of Italian heritage and her family always served "beans and greens" as she stated. They had a dairy cow that Loretta milked each morning before she went to school. She had other chores when she returned home.

house. They had no days off, so they attended school in all kinds of weather. There was no indoor plumbing, but there were two outhouses, one for the girls and one for the boys and the well pump just outside the entrance door. A woodburning stove heated the building and the older you were the further away from the stove you sat. The younger children were smaller, so they sat closer to the heat. Loretta remembers wearing gloves on some winter days because it was so cold in the classroom. All the students had jobs to do before and after school and sometimes during recess.

In the 1920s the daily walk to and from the stone schoolhouse with friends and siblings was always a great adventure. The landscape along Woodtick Road was quite different from today because the original Woodtick Road ran very close to the Mad River down behind the houses that are built on the northwest side of Woodtick Road. Garthwaite Road was originally part of old Woodtick Road

and Finch Road began at that intersection. A narrow wooden bridge took you across the Mad River when traveling on old Woodtick Road. The kids could stop at the river and find many interesting creatures in the water. In 1928 improvements began on Woodtick Road; they moved the road and bridge away from the Mad River and out of the flood zone and a new cement bridge replaced the wooden one. Loretta said, "Just watching that construction was an education in itself." Most of the land along both sides of Woodtick Road up to Nichols Road was part of Bock's farm. As you got closer to the reservoir, the land ownership changed to Mr. Gustave Cornelis, a prominent businessman in the Woodtick section of town. Loretta remembers him as a grouchy man who would chase them off his property, but they always found a way to return because there was so much to do there. There was the swinging bridge that ran over the Mad River; the boys would swing it and scare the girls as they crossed. Then there was the half-mile trotter track located where the baseball field is today. Mr. Cornelis loved racing his horse and sulky around the track, and they loved watching this on their walk home from school.

lemon tart that Aunt Mary gave her. Originally Roberta thought there was a connection between the name Drew to the actress, Drew Barrymore, but thanks to our excellent researcher, Deb DuBois we realized that is not the case. Deb did find out from the 1920 census that Aunt Mary Drew's home was at 21 Woodtick Road, which was prob-

ably close to our town line just north of Sharon Road and in those days that road was called Lover's Lane. Aunt Mary Drew was born in Ireland circa 1836 and her family came to this country in the mid-1800's. It is believed that her maiden name might have been Bennett because she was living with that family on lower Woodtick Road in 1920. There were several Bennets also living in that household in the 1920 census: Joseph, listed as the head of the house; Andrew, the father; and John, the brother; Mary Drew was listed as an aunt; our assumption is that she was a sister or sister-in-law to Andrew Bennett. If only that rocker could share its history, we might know the exact story of Aunt Mary Drew and the rocker. Thank you, Roberta, for sharing the rocker and your mom's childhood memories.

It was always interesting to listen to Loretta's memories of attending the old Stone Schoolhouse on Nichols Road. She began school in September of 1922 at the age of six and graduated from 8th grade in 1929. One of the advantages of attending a one-room schoolhouse was that if you were a bright child, you could easily learn lessons that were being taught to the older students. That was the case with Loretta because she skipped third grade. She attended this school for 7 years and then went on to high school in Waterbury. Loretta loved her days at the old stone School-

Roberta remembers her mother telling her the story about the rocker that originally belonged to a neighbor who lived near them on lower Woodtick Road. The neighbor's name was Aunt Mary Drew. Loretta said that she would sit on Aunt Mary's lap while rocking in the chair and eating a
