It's Summertime!

summer is a time for our kids and grandkids to get outside and play. More time playing can increase the chances of bumps and bruises and the occasional dental trouble. Below is a short list of the most common issues I come across as well as the initial steps for parents, grandparents and counselors to take before the child can be seen at the dental office.

- 1. Toothache Rinse the mouth with warm water. Use dental floss to remove any trapped food. Apply a cold compress to reduce swelling if needed. Avoid giving aspirin, though Advil and Tylenol are fine. Then call your dentist.
- 2. Knocked Out Tooth For a permanent tooth, rinse it gently without scrubbing, and try to reinsert it fully into the socket. If this isn't possible, place it in milk or a tooth preservation product and get to a dentist immediately. Time is of the essence if the body is going to accept the tooth back into place and heal. For a baby tooth, DO NOT reinsert it. Immediately call your dentist.
- 3. Chipped or Fractured Tooth Rinse the mouth with warm water. Save any pieces of the tooth. Apply a cold compress to the face to reduce swelling. Use gauze to stop any bleeding. Then call your dentist.
- 4. Bitten Tongue or Lip Clean the area with water. Hold pressure against the bleeding area for 2-3 full minutes and repeat holding pressure until the bleeding stops. If the bleeding doesn't stop within 40-60 minutes, or if the cut looks concerning, seek medical attention.
- 5. Tooth Abscess Rinse the mouth with a mild saltwater solution to help draw out infection. Apply a cold compress for pain and swelling. You can give Advil or Tylenol as needed. Then call your dentist.

It's important to remain calm and reassure the child while administering first aid. Seeking prompt dental care is crucial for proper treatment and to prevent further complications. Let's hope for a relaxing and enjoyable summer without the need to see the dentist.

ow far has our country strayed from respecting the opinions of others? Have people forgotten the golden rule? Or that we are neighbors with equal rights to our opinions? The recent assassination attempt on former President Trump is being described as a wake-up call for many.

Not for us. Serving in the state legislature for a few years has already given us a clear understanding of just how divided the country has become. When it comes to people who are actively engaged in politics, many have chosen their camp, their news networks, their trusted sources. While most have simply siloed themselves, there are those that cannot wait to engage.

Engagement can and should be a good thing. In fact, if there is a clear and identifiable problem leading to our divided nation, it is a failure to communicate, to understand, or even care to understand where others are coming from, and why they hold the views they do.

It's the type of engagement that matters. For outspoken conservatives like us, we can't wait to find new ways to connect. That's what politics is about. It's selling your ideas, your worldview, and making the case why our path is the better one.

For others, the outlet has become hate and violence, and it needs to stop.

Both political parties certainly have their platforms and their ideas but in this modern political era, the polarization seems much more focused on people and personalities, icons if you will, than on policy and ideas.

Former President Trump is the textbook example of this. It's remarkable just how polarizing a figure he has become. Without exaggeration, people either love him or hate him. Even more fascinating for political wonks like us is to contemplate just how much people support and approve of Trump's policies and results, while simultaneously disliking him for his demeanor.

Some of that is clearly self-inflicted, but how much is really a result of media and news agencies being pumped with millions of dollars designed to shape our views?

A Call for Civility

The major news networks are engaging in propaganda these days, not news, and American consumers have become content to absorb the "facts" that are offered. Sadly, many of those "facts" go unchecked and unchallenged.

This is, at least in part, how Democrats effectively defeated Trump in 2020. They convinced a significant part of the nation that Trump is a racist, describing white supremacists as "good people" in Charlotte, and that he colluded with the Russians to steal the 2016 election, among a hundred other distortions and mistruths.

So many people, even today, still believe these demonstrably false and divisive lies. We too have been on the receiving end of similar distortions, and even the threats of violence that they sometimes manifest.

No one is perfect but both of us have worked hard to do politics the right way, to be civil, to be clear in our positions, to be unafraid to defend them and debate them, if necessary, to listen, and even to change on occasion.

Most importantly, we are committed to honoring our unique and amazing American system of representation. This means we treat our constituents as our focus and guide, and while we cannot agree with everyone all the time, we always offer civility and respect.

In recent years, it has become difficult to encourage good candidates to run. The best people often say no. Who can blame them? Being a "politician" has become an insult in most circles. The result is more truly bad politicians who do not show respect, or worse, those that believe they were elected to be the boss of others.

Thankfully, former President Trump survived the attempt on his life, but the actions of the gunman took the life of an innocent father who attended the rally simply to support his political candidate. Two other people were seriously injured in the shooting, due to the incomprehensible actions of a 20-year-old with hate in his heart.

It will take time for authorities to uncover the gunman's motive, details of his online activity, and how he gained access to the event. However, this part is clear. This individual tragically chose to express his ideological differences through violence.

Calls for unity are everywhere, and should be applauded, but they are also naïve. People who disagree so markedly

are not going to suddenly join hands. What they can do, however, is debate.

Ironically, arguing policy views and debating ideas is the very thing that would diminish hatred – and the potential for violence.

We have seen it in our own political campaigns. Our opponents often make personal attacks, and we respond politely with facts and policy – and respect. The result has been positive for us both and has granted us the chance to continue to serve.

We want to take this moment to ask our neighbors to help restore a small bit of American culture and consider setting an example for others.

Disagreements have always existed in politics, but recently, the tone of those differences has taken on a meaner edge. After the attempted assassination of the former president, cruel comments and images appeared online with lightning speed – even from candidates running for office.

Regardless of party, hoping for a person's demise at the hands of a sniper's bullet is reprehensible.

The name-calling, the insults, the quick calls for violence, so much of the rhetoric has gotten out of hand, particularly online. We urge everyone who comments or publishes on social media to pause and consider their words before hitting the enter key. The person on the other side of the computer screen or cell phone is a living person, with family, friends, and loved ones.

Remember that a key ingredient, the most important, of American freedom is the right to your own ideas, views, and words. Recognizing the right of others to theirs should be celebrated, even when we disagree.

These are our neighbors, the people we see at the grocery store, the folks sitting next to us in traffic. Just because our political philosophies differ, it does not make us sworn enemies. There is so much that we can agree on for the good of our state and the nation. It starts with restoring respect for the Golden Rule. Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

Take notice that the proposed amendments to the Wolcott Town Charter, which will be placed on the November 5, 2024, ballots, for the electors of the Town of Wolcott to approve or to not approve, are listed below. **The referendum is to take place on Tuesday, November 5, 2024, between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. at all voting districts.** The ballet question relating to the proposed amendments to the Charter will appear as follows:

"SHALL THE TOWN OF WOLCOTT CHARTER BE AMENDED AS PROVIDED IN THE CHARTER REVISION COMMISSION'S FINAL REPORT DATED MAY 22, 2024, TO BECOME EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2025?

2024 CHARTER REVISIONS FOR PUBLICATION Charter Revision Commission's additions in bold and deletions in brackets. This is for subsections changed only.

SEC. 202. ELECTIVE OFFICERS.

(a) At each municipal election there shall be elected nine (9) members of the Town Council hereinafter referred to as the Council. There shall be three (3) members of the Council elected from each of the three (3) voting districts. Each political party shall nominate two (2) candidates from each of the three (3) districts. This shall not preclude an individual from running in his district as provided in General Statutes. The three (3) candidates having the largest number of votes from each of the three districts will serve on the Council. All electors in the Town will be eligible to vote for two (2) candidates in each district. [The maximum number of members, as defined by Section 402 of this Charter of the same political party shall serve on any elected Board, Commission, or the Council and] No more than six (6) members of the Council shall be of the same political party, provided further however, that no more than 2 members of the same political party shall serve on the Council from any single district. For the purposes of this section, political party [is defined as the party of endorsement] shall be determined in the same manner as set forth in General Statutes § 9-167a (g), as may be amended.

(e) All elective officers shall hold office until their successors have been chosen and qualified. All elective offices, with the exception of the **Mayor**, Council, Town Clerk, Board of Education, and Registrars of Voters, shall take office on the first Monday following election. The Town Council shall take office as herein provided. The Town Clerk and Registrars of Voters shall take office in accordance with General Statutes. The Board of Education shall take office within seven (7) days following election.

SEC. 302. CHAIRMAN

(a) The Council shall meet at [8:00] **7:00 P.M.** on the second Wednesday following its election to organize and to elect a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman. This will be the first order of business. The Mayor will preside, without vote, over the Council until this order of business is completed. The Chairman of the Council shall have a regular vote only. The Chairman shall preside over all meetings of the Council and perform such other duties consistent with his or her office as may be imposed by the Council. Unless otherwise specified herein, during his or her absence or disability, his or her duties shall be performed by the member of the Council chosen by the Council as Vice-Chairman. The Chairman of the Council is an ex-officio member, without vote, of all Legislative Committees. The Town Council shall make no contracts, verbal or written, from the date of the election, until the successor council has been sworn in.

SEC. 402. MINORITY REPRESENTATION. (a) Minority representation on all boards, commissions, committees, departments, or similar bodies, whether elective or appointive shall be in accordance with the following table:

[(a)] **(b)** Those boards, commissions. committees, departments, or similar bodies, whether elective or appointive with more than nine (9) members shall have no more than 2/3 of their members from the same political party.

[(b)] (c) Vacancies in appointed positions shall be posted on the Town website for a minimum of five days prior to the appointing authority taking action on any final appointments. Any person affiliated with a party or not so affiliated shall have the ability to submit their name to the appointing authority. The appointing authority shall give due consideration to the recommendations of the major political parties before final appointments are made.

(d) General Statutes § 9-167a and all of its parts, as may be amended, shall apply to all boards, commissions, committees, departments, or similar bodies, whether elective or appointive, with respect to minority representation, excepting therefrom, however, the Town Council which shall be governed in accordance with Sec. 202 of this Charter. Notwith-standing the foregoing, in applying the minority representation rule contained in Sec. 202 to the Town Council, political party shall be determined in the same manner as set forth in Connecticut General Statutes § 9-167a (g), as may be amended.

SEC. 404. LIBRARY BOARD OF [DIRECTORS] **TRUSTEES**. The Town Council shall appoint a Library Board of [Directors] **Trustees** to consist of [seven (7)] **nine (9)** electors of the Town, not more than [four (4)] **five (5)** of whom shall belong to any one political party. The Library Board of [Directors] **Trustees** shall appoint the Town Librarian and library employees and carry out all other duties as prescribed by General Statutes and Town Ordinance. Terms of office shall be consistent with this Charter.

SEC. 408. CHIEF OF POLICE

(e) The police chief shall submit to the Town Council a promotion policy and organizational chart for approval within three months of ratification of this charter. No promotions may be made without a current Council approved promotion policy and organizational chart in place. Promotions within the Police Department shall be made according to the approved promotion policy and organizational chart. All promotions recommended by the police chief in accordance with the approved promotion policy and organizational chart shall be submitted to the Mayor [and the Town Council] for final approval. Subsequent revisions to the Police Department promotion policy and organizational chart must be submitted to the Town Council for approval.

[(A) CIVILIAN POLICE REVIEW BOARD

(a) General: There shall be a Civilian Police Review Board (CPRB), which will receive, investigate and make appropriate recommendations to the Mayor and Chief of Police of the Town of Wolcott regarding complaints of citizens not excluding employees of the Police Department, against members of the Wolcott Police Department and/or civilian employees thereof.

(b) Powers and Duties of Board: The CPRB shall be notified by the Mayor's Office, the Chief of Police and or any individual member of CPRB of any and all complaints against members of the Wolcott Police Department and/or civilian employees thereof whether such complaints be written, oral or anonymous.

The CPRB shall be provided with all police documents, reports, electronic transmission, videotape and any other transcriptions related to any civilian complaint. (The Chief of Police may take appropriate actions to maintain the security of police documents, reports, electronic transmissions and videotape reviewed by CPRB) The CPRB may request the Chief of Police conduct appropriate internal affairs investigations of serious complaints against members or civilian employees of the police department. The CPRB shall review the conclusions of any internal affairs investigation of a complaint prior to any disciplinary action being taken and recommend further investigation to the Chief of Police if appropriate. The CPRB may request written statements made under oath through the Chief of Police from any member or civilian employee of the department and of the complainant in order to fully investigate any complaint. The CPRB shall make a written report of their investigation and findings and their

recommendation as to discipline to be taken if any regarding all complaints, when appropriate, to the Mayor and Chief of Police, however, the CPRB shall not have authority to impose discipline. The Chief of Police and/or Mayor, where appropriate, shall make the decision regarding discipline. The Chief of Police and/or Mayor shall explain his or her disciplinary action in writing for each complaint if different from the recommendation of the CPRB.

- (c) The Civilian Police Review Board shall consist of five members, no more than three of whom shall be members of the same political party.
 - (i) Town Council Representative: One Town Council member shall serve as a liaison to the CPRB.
 - (ii) Appointments; term of office. No later than January 1, 2011, the Mayor with Town Council approval shall appoint five (5) members for a term of two (2) years and thereafter, in accordance with Section 401.
 - (iii) No Compensation. Members shall serve without compensation.
- (d) Organization of Civilian Police Review Board: During January 2011 and January of each odd numbered year thereafter, the Board shall select from among its members a chair, vice chair and such other officers as it may desire.
 - (i) Secretary and record keeping. The Mayor shall appoint a secretary to the Board which secretary may not be a member of the Board. The Town Clerk shall act as record keeper for the Board.
 - (ii) Meeting Schedule. The Board shall meet no less than two times per year. The organizational meeting shall be no more than 30 days after the appointment process of each term.
 - (iii) Authority and actions of members. No member shall have any authority to act on behalf of the Board except pursuant to an order regularly made at a meeting of the Board.
 - (iv) Quorum and voting requirements. Three members shall constitute a quorum and a concurrent vote of no fewer than three members shall be necessary for the transaction of business.
 - (v) Public meetings and public participation. All meetings, except executive sessions, as defined in the State Freedom of Information Act or any successor thereto, shall be public. At the start of each regularly scheduled public meeting the Board shall allot a minimum of 15 minutes for public speaking, with a minimum of three minutes per speaker.
 - (vi) Bylaws. The Board shall have the power to adopt its own bylaws for the conduct of its business accordance with the provisions of this code.]
- SEC. 410. PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION. The Mayor shall appoint a Planning and Zoning Commission subject to the approval of the Council which shall consist of five (5) electors of the Town, not more than three (3) of whom shall belong to any one political party, with duties as prescribed by the General Statutes. The Mayor shall appoint with the approval of the Town Council three (3) alternate members to the Commission, not more than two (2) of whom shall belong to any one political party.
- SEC. 423. PERMANENT PENSION COMMITTEE. [The Mayor shall appoint a Permanent Pension Committee] **There shall be a Permanent Pension Committee** consisting of 7 electors of the town whose membership and duties shall be prescribed by Town Ordinance and whose terms of office shall be consistent with this Charter.

SEC. 427. CIVILIAN POLICE REVIEW BOARD

- (a) General: There shall be a Civilian Police Review Board (CPRB), which will receive, investigate and make appropriate recommendations to the Mayor and Chief of Police of the Town of Wolcott regarding complaints of citizens not excluding employees of the Police Department, against members of the Wolcott Police Department and/or civilian employees thereof.
- (b) Powers and Duties of Board: The CPRB shall be notified by the Mayor's Office, the Chief of Police and or any individual member of CPRB of any and all complaints against members of the Wolcott Police Department and/or civilian employees thereof whether such complaints be written, oral or anonymous.
- (c) The CPRB shall be provided with all police documents, reports, electronic transmission, videotape and any other transcriptions related to any civilian complaint. The Chief of Police may take appropriate actions to maintain the security of police documents, reports, electronic transmissions and videotape reviewed by CPRB. The CPRB may request the Chief of Police conduct appropriate internal affairs investigations of serious complaints against members or civilian employees of the police department. The CPRB shall review the conclusions of any internal affairs investigation of a complaint prior to any disciplinary action being taken and recommend further investigation to the Chief of Police if appropriate.  - (i) Secretary and record keeping. The Mayor shall appoint a secretary to the Board which secretary may not be a member of the Board. The Town Clerk shall act as record keeper for the Board.
 - (ii) Meeting Schedule. The Board shall meet no less than two times per year. The organizational meeting shall be no more than 30 days after the appointment process of each term.
 - (iii) Authority and actions of members. No member shall have any authority to act on behalf of the Board except pursuant to an order regularly made at a meeting of the Board.
 - (iv) Quorum and voting requirements. Three members shall constitute a quorum and a concurrent vote of no fewer than three members shall be necessary for the transaction of business.
 - (v) Public meetings and public participation. All meetings, except executive sessions, as defined in the State Freedom of Information Act or any successor thereto, shall be public. At the start of each regularly scheduled public meeting the Board shall allot a minimum of 15 minutes for public speaking, with a minimum of three minutes per speaker.
 - (vi) Bylaws. The Board shall have the power to adopt its own bylaws for the conduct of its business in accordance with the provisions of this code.

SEC.907. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Revised Charter shall take effect on January 1, [2022] 2025.

The full text of the proposed Charter may be examined and copies may be obtained from the Town Clerk's Office at Wolcott Town Hall, 10 Kenea Avenue, Wolcott, CT, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Wednesday; Thursdays 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.; Fridays 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. A copy shall be mailed to any person requesting one from the Town Clerk's Office. The full text of the proposed Charter is also posted on the Town of Wolcott website at www.wolcottct.org

Wolcott Historical Society - August 2024

his year marks sixty-two years since Wolcott High School's first graduating class, the Class of 1962 walked across that auditorium stage. It also marks the year that they celebrate their 80th birthday. The Class of 1963 will

celebrate sixty-one years since their graduation, the Class of 1964 will celebrate sixty years, and it will be fifty-nine years for the Class of 1965. Although many of our teachers and administrators are no longer with us, one of our teachers Mrs. Geraldine Pelegano, is celebrating her 100th birthday! A very Happy Birthday to her. This month I would like to revisit some of the history of Wolcott High School and recollections of those early years.

Back in 2007 and 2015 the first four graduating classes started having reunions together. They had attended school together for so many years that it was only natural to start having joint reunions. Everyone attending felt that as they aged the reunions seemed to have more meaning or maybe it was because the lists of students from each class who were no longer with us was growing, and we realized how important it was to keep those fond memories alive. It has been nine years since the last reunion of these classes, so it

was time for another. Come September 21st we will once again reunite with former classmates at East Street Eatery from 5:30 - 9:30 and try to recognize each other and share stories of our times at Wolcott High over a buffet dinner.

Prior to the building of Wolcott High School graduates of our elementary schools attended high school in Waterbury, Bristol and Southington with our town bearing the cost of tuition and transportation. Our Board of Education was concerned that our growing enrollment would soon cause these towns to close their doors to our students, so discussions began on building our own high school. About that same time, Mr. Willy Pritchard's health was failing, and he owned approximately fifty acres of land on Bound Line and Minor Roads and a homestead on Center Street. These properties had acquired some debt to the town so upon his death, the town was able to come to an agreement with his estate administrators to acquire fifty acres of land on Bound Line Road for a payment of \$25,000. By October 1956 four years after the purchase of the land, a school building

committee was established to prepare plans for a twenty-eight-room Junior-Senior High School. It would also include an auditorium, cafeteria, gymnasium, library and offices for the superintendent of schools. Thus, construction on the new high school began.

By the fall of 1958 our school enrollment was at a new high and classes were forced to go on double sessions. In November of that same year the first group of freshmen were transferred into six partially completed rooms on the second floor of Wolcott High School. As additional classes were completed another class of students was added. By late



Our school nurses Mrs. Doris Peterson and Mrs. Rose Klitka. fall of 1959 grades 7-10 inclusive were attending Wolcott High School, but it was not the typical school scenario. Students received their education while working through a cacophony of sounds: saws buzzing, hammers pounding and workman shouting. They walked over planks and around piles of building materials to get to their classes, something that would never be allowed today. By 1961 the Board of Education asked voters to support a twenty-room addition to the high school and so the construction continued.

As I perused the yearbooks from those first four classes, it opened the floodgates, and those memories came crashing through. There were so many firsts for the Class of 1962, but the classes of '63, '64, and '65 were also able to enjoy those special times. There was the choosing of the school colors: scarlet and grey and the school mascot: the eagle. Then there were the firsts in school sports, activities, clubs, dances and programs. Academics were of the utmost importance, but school sports played an important role as well. When I graduated in 1964, I remember baseball, softball, soccer, basketball, and field hockey. As I looked over the yearbook from the class of 1965, I noticed that golf was in its third season and that it was the first season for varsity track. Over the years more sport teams were added, and competition increased as well as league changes.

Amid these sounds of construction, the learning process continued because we were all in it together and soon, we would have a new high school. Mr. D'Agostino, the first principal stated it well in the Class of 1962's yearbook, "Your 'educational adventure' began in rough surroundings, in an atmosphere of growth, in a building in the early stages of construction. Your minds were alert and receptive. There was excitement in the air and optimistic expectancy and hope in your hearts, and with it all, a keen sense of responsibility...In this respect, you had to carry a heavy burdenyou had to pioneer- you had to experiment- you had to make

decisions that would be lasting – you had to establish firsts..." The Class of 1962 established these firsts, the rest of us shared in their glory, which tightened the bond between all students in these first four classes at Wolcott High School. This new adventure brought students from all sections of town into one central school building. This was a BIG first; it allowed students in four grade levels to meet other students they may have never met because of where they lived, especially if they had to attend high school in Waterbury or Bristol as older siblings did. One hundred six students in our first graduating class from Wolcott High School walked across the auditorium stage on June 20, 1962. Forty-eight members of that graduating class went on to a school of higher education.

A quote from the 1962 yearbook sums it up nicely, "We, the first class to graduate from Wolcott High School, are proud of our meager beginnings, just as we are proud of our completed and continually developing high school and all that it represents to us. As with the building, so the foundations of our education were built." Back in 2015, I asked former students who attended the reunion to share some of their memories from their high school days and here are some of their comments. "We went to school while the workers were still putting the finishing touches on the building and the language was colorful. Mr. D, ever the diplomat, talked to them and said he hoped to expand the student's knowledge but not in that way." "The cafeteria was not finished so we brown bagged our lunch and ate it in the classroom. Milk was brought to individual classes. Only the freshmen had new furniture, 7th and 8th graders used wooden chairs with the tablet on the side." "I remember like it was yesterday when the intercom came on with the announcement that President Kennedy was shot. I was sitting in Mr. McManus's classroom and there was dead silence as all my classmates listened with fear and intensity on their faces!" "I remember Mr. Shapiro clearing his throat before any general announcement. He wrote in my yearbook... "and I will be here clearing my throat." "I remember our trip for class of '64 to the World's Fair in New York and also, several of my classmates and myself making the gray uniforms for the junior varsity cheerleading team with Miss Rice and Mrs. Fitzpatrick." "When I was on the baseball team and at practice, I broke a half dozen fungo bats just hitting fly balls to the outfielders. After that the coach (John Morris) would not let me touch the practice fungo bats." "I remember that a group of students from the class of '65 went on the class trip to Europe, the summer of 1965, had a small article and picture in Seventeen magazine." "I remember preparing stage sets in the gym for what I think was either the junior or senior prom and music was playing, I think the song was something along the lines 'Getting married in the chapel'- we were so cool." These memories have lasted over sixty years and are still quite vivid in our minds today.

Recently, a reunion committee has been meeting to organize this next get together and we are hoping to reminisce about those early adventures that seem like they happened just yesterday. Life goes on and so do our memories.
