2024 Wolcott Lions Annual Pediatric



Screening



The Wolcott Lions club held their annual pre-school Pediatric eye screening the week of November 11-15, 2024 at the following pre-schools: Alcott Elementary school, Children's Village and Happy Hands Prep LLC & Bright Start.

Lion's volunteers used the SCOPE PediaVision Screener, a state-of-the-art camera equipped to take a picture of the child's eye. It has the ability to identify vision issues in children aged 2-6. It is done by taking a picture of a child's eye in low light from a four-foot distance. The vision screener measures visual acuity (near or far-sightedness), lazy eye astigmatism, detached retina, corneal deformity and other potentially serious eye issues. Finding these issues at an early age helps the children being able to resolve their eye problems before starting school. If treated early, by an Ophthalmologist, issues can be corrected or cured early to keep vision problems from interfering with the child's education.

This year 116 children were tested, 110 passed and 5 came back with identified vison issues Reports were sent home with the child's test info so the parents can see the results of the test and those that has vision issues can be brought to a Doctor for further evaluation. The Wolcott Lions' club has been testing children for over 13 years, starting in 2011. As of 2024 1,639 children have been tested. There were 1,516 that passed and 116 where vision issues were identified.

Lions International originally started this screening program. The Connecticut Lions then became involved with the screening and the Wolcott Lion's club joined the effort in 2011 led by Lion Dave Desaulniers. The following Wolcott Lions helped Dave with the screening this year: Harry Najarian, Steve Slater, Bill Phelan, Peter Merza, Mike Graham, Kerri Tutolo, Dave Santarseio and Dave Wilson, along with his therapy dog Teagan. The children really enjoyed petting the dog.

Thanks to all the Wolcott Lions that helped make this program a huge success. Thanks also to the pre-schools for allowing us to come and examine the children's eyes with a Parents consent form. Honored to Serve in the New Year

s we enter a new year, I hope you and your families had a wonderful holiday and are looking

forward to 2025. When the new legislative session begins on Jan. 8, I will be ready to serve as your voice at the Capitol and fight on your behalf.

I am again honored that House Minority Leader Vincent Candelora has appointed me as ranking member of the General Assembly's Government Administration and Elections Committee.

This is an important leadership role on a committee that has cognizance on all matters related to state and federal relations, interstate compacts, constitutional amendments, and all matters relating to elections and election laws, among other important roles. I will remain a staunch defender of the integrity of the state's voting system and will work toward implementing more safeguards to protect against voter fraud.

The integrity of our elections is critically important, which is why I will serve as a needed voice to advocate on behalf of legislation and policies that restore faith in our system. Along with Sen. Sampson, I will push back against any extreme policies put forward by the majority, including any attempts to implement voting by mail, which is just another opportunity for bad actors to exploit the system.

As we enter the new year, I also wanted to let you know about new laws that have gone into effect in Connecticut as of Jan. 1. I did not support all the legislation below, but I wanted to share this information with you, so you are aware of it:

PA 24-77 (Coerced Debt)

Addressing domestic violence in our state is important, which is why I supported legislation that helps protect victims from financial abuse, specifically "coerced debt." This new law permits a victim of financial abuse to contact their credit card company for an investigation and possible discharge of the debt. Coerced debt is defined as "debt" incurred in the name of a victim as a result of any duress, intimidation, threat of force, force, or undue influence.

PA 24-8 (Expansion of Paid Sick Leave)

Past law required employers with 50 or more employees to provide up to 40 hours of paid sick leave annually to their "service workers" in certain specified occupations. This new law, which I did not support, significantly expands Connecticut's paid sick leave requirements, placing an undue burden on employers, especially small businesses. As of January 1, 2025, private-sector employers with 25 to employees, and eventually this will apply to those with even a single employee by 2027. It broadens the definition of family members for whom leave can be taken and prevents employers from requiring documentation for leave.

These changes make Connecticut's laws among the most employer-unfriendly in the nation, adding excessive costs and scheduling challenges, especially for small businesses struggling to stay afloat. And this law forces employers to provide up to 40 hours of paid leave annually, even for part-time employees, creating significant scheduling and recordkeeping difficulties.



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The Mature Mouth

s scintillating and varied as dental topics are, I sometimes find myself with a touch of dental writer's block when thinking of an idea for my column. So, I occasionally will ask a patient for their suggestion on a topic that interests them. Thanks to a long-time patient and overall great woman, I present this month's column: "The Mature Mouth".

As we age, some of the details on how we care for ourselves change. Though eating healthy and exercise are always important, perhaps minimizing salt intake and resistance training at the gym become a stronger focus as we age and our bodies change. The same is true of our mouths. Though daily brushing and flossing are always important, there are some changes occur, and the awareness of these changes can be beneficial in order to help overcome the challenges they present.

Medications: As we get older, many individuals start taking medications for their heart, their blood pressure, cholesterol and so on. Many of these medications have side effects that, although suboptimal, are outweighed by the benefits of the medication. Dry mouth is a very common side effect of many medications. Our saliva is very helpful for many things, especially its function to minimize decay. The dry mouth effect of medications can lead to decay even in patients that previously had not had much decay. Being more diligent with our oral hygiene and diet becomes more critical when taking daily medications.

Gum Disease: gum disease is typically a very slowly progressing disease. Mature mouths are where time catches up with us, even with a slowly progressing problem. Unfortunately, gum disease is not truly reversible once it progresses past its most early stages. As it slowly progresses, the bone around the teeth slowly breaks down, which leads to the gums slowly shrinking away from the teeth as well. Even when previous gum disease is stabilized, the missing bone and gums don't grow back. This receding of tissue exposes spaces between teeth and exposes root surfaces. So, we now start accumulating food and plaque much more easily between and around our teeth. This debris sits against the exposed root surfaces, which don't even have enamel and are much more prone to fast growing decay. This is a recipe for problems. Making sure to clean these spaces of food after each meal and snack goes a long way to minimize your risk of dental problems.

RAdm Kevin Delaney has been named the honorary chairman of this year's visit of the Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall to Wolcott. This Agent Orange ceremony that we will hold while the Wall is here honors RAdm Delaney

and all those suffering from the toxic effects of this chemical herbicide and defoliant.

Kevin graduated with honors from Wolcott High School in June of 1964 and received a congressional appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy, graduating from there in June 1968 with a BS in Engineering. Three days later he married his wife, Pat, in Philadelphia, PA. He next began flight training at Naval Air Station Pensacola and received his gold wings in Aug 1969.

In Dec 1969 Delaney reported to his first operational assignment with the famed Navy "Seawolves" of Helicopter Attack (Light) Squadron Three in the Republic of Vietnam where he flew a UH-1B helicopter gunship on 686 combat missions in support of Navy riverine forces and SEAL units in the Mekong Delta. Over his 34-year Navy career Admiral Delanev received 98 military awards and decorations, 64 for combat action. Among his decorations are the Silver Star Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross, 11 Single Action Air Medals, 26 Strike/Flight Air Medals, 6 Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Crosses, the Navy Distinguished Service Medal, and 4 awards of the Legion of Merit. Rarely did a cry for help come from a voice he didn't recognize, Delaney said. It soon became a personal war for all the pilots after they medevacked a seriously wounded friend, or carried a body bag containing the remains of a classmate, friend, or comrade.

Admiral Delaney had 6 command tours including 2 award winning aviation squadrons, an aircraft wing and Naval Air Station (NAS) Jacksonville. Under his command NAS Jacksonville was selected from 178 Navy bases worldwide for the 1991 Presidents Installation Excellence Award as the best shore installation. Admiral Delaney also served as commander of shore activities for the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. Just prior to retirement, he served as the Navy's regional commander for the Southeastern United States and the Caribbean. In this assignment, he was responsible for more than 40 commands, including 14 major Naval installations and four hospitals.

The following is a small part of a speech given by RAdm Delaney, at a Seawolf reunion May 1994. Admiral Delaney's speech was intended for Seawolves and their families. But it is also an excellent oral history of the Seawolves squadron long after he had served as gunship pilot and Lieutenant JG on Det-8 of the famous combat ready pilots, door gunners and maintenance personnel.

"Thank you so much for your kind introduction. Needless to say, it's a very great and very humbling honor to address this group of heroes, this group of dedicated Americans who have given so much of themselves to serve our great country and who can say very proudly. I served with the SEAWOLVES of HAL-3 in Vietnam.

Unlike our carrier counterparts we were land based and never were far from the action. Living in our bunkers and hootches, it was not uncommon that on our off nights, we would grab a few semi-rusted cans of our well-preserved Pabst Blue Ribbon beer, a PRC radio and a rocket box. We'd sit on top of a bunker or revetment and then tune in the action as we watched the sky light up with the red and green neon-like stripes of tracer fire which were punctuated with rocket fire emanating from overhead Seawolf gunships. Rarely was there a night when the SEAWOLVES would not be engaged in multiple scrambles. Or we would be lying in hot, humid, non-air-conditioned spaces, partially wearing flight suits and maybe even our boots, trying to catch a few nods of sleep while waiting for the whispers of PBR (Patrol Boat, Riverine) sailors to begin on the radio, knowing that very soon the call to "scramble the SEAWOLVES" would be heard over the radio and literally within seconds we would be cranking engines and spinning rotors to fly one more time into harms way to protect the guys on the river, SEALS in trouble...or Army advisors in outposts being overrun.

The mere word "scramble" released a flow of adrenaline that energized us all. It was not uncommon to be airborne in one or two minutes after "scramble the SEAWOLVES" was blasted over our radio. The VC operated at night so of course most of our scrambles were at night. The VC also knew there were advantages to attacking in bad weather, so of course our most exciting times were in bad weather and at night.

It was a dirty war in the delta. As a rule, the VC took no prisoners and they had no rules. They definitely had never heard of the Geneva Convention or the Red Cross

and there was a price on the head of every Seawolf pilot and door gunner. The Red Cross on the sides of many of our Huey's served as nothing more than a large, convenient target for the VC to shoot at. They would steal our ammo and shoot it at us in their weapons while their ammo conveniently did not fit in our weapons.

Let me say what an honor it is to be called Seawolf, and how much I value the friendships that began half a globe away. In closing, let me slightly modify a quotation from John F Kennedy and say... "any man who may be asked in this century what he did to make his life worthwhile, I think I can respond with a great deal of pride and satisfaction, I served with the United States Navy SEAWOLVES of HAL-3."

"Thank You and may God bless the United States of America."


Admiral Delaney retired in 1998 as the most decorated officer in the U.S. Navy. As was mentioned earlier, of the 98 awards and decorations he received, 64 were for combat action. He soared to new heights during his retirement, a long civic career that included serving on the boards of 19 area nonprofits, ranging from Ronald McDonald House, Jacksonville University, to the Wounded Warrior Project and K9's for Warriors. He also served as president of the Florida State College of Jacksonville Foundation, a two-term member of the Board of Trustees of Jacksonville University and Florida State College, past president of the Rotary Club and a Paul Harris Fellow.

Admiral Delaney was honored by the Small Business Administration as the "Veteran Small Business Champion of the Year" for the State of Florida and as the 2014 Veteran of Influence. He was honored by the Jackson-ville Chamber of Commerce in 2014 as the most influential veteran, and he was installed as the very first member of their Military Hall of Fame. Sadly, he passed from lung cancer in 2015, a presumptive disease of Agent Orange.

Admiral Delaney, a Wolcott native, graduate of Wolcott High School, a hero during the Vietnam War, Veteran of the U.S. Navy and a tireless advocate on behalf of his fellow veterans has been named the Honorary Chairman of The Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall.

Wolcott Historical Society - January 2025

appy New Year to all our Wolcott history lovers from Lthe Wolcott Historical Society. Several months ago, I met with Bonnie Fleming Richardson and her brother Lisle when they donated the Augusta Somers Miller quilt. At that

time, we took a trip down memory lane by visiting the old Peterson farmhouse on Spindle Hill Road. Bonnie and Lisle grew up in the house next to Peterson Park on Mad River Road and have fond memories of Peterson's farm. Not only were they related to the family, but growing up their families along with the Kraft's who lived across the street from the farm spent a great deal of time together. They helped on the farm and celebrated many of the family get togethers in the old farmhouse. Bonnie remembered that just inside the entryway of the house someone had stamped the name "Alcott" into the wood, and she was surprised that you could still see the name. As we walked around the property Bonnie referred to one of the barns as the "milk house". I had never realized that was where the

Oaks" as memorials to the expected new state Constitution. Although the electors voted to hold the convention, the revisions were never passed, but the delegates went home with their souvenirs of this historic meeting. Mr. Upson planted the pin oak seedling on his property so that he could maintain it while it was young. It was his intent to even-

> tually transplant the tree to the Town Green, but the transplanting never occurred. Thus after 123 years, the tree continues to grow on the side of Spindle Hill Road across from the James Alcott homestead. When Mr. Upson died in 1918, the property at 621 Spindle Hill Road was sold to Carl and Helma Peterson.

> The Petersons also purchased the James Thomas house (where Seth Thomas, the clockmaker was born) at 36 Peterson Lane and about 150 acres of land along Spindle Hill and Mad River Roads. They established the Peterson Dairy Farm in 1923,

which it was in operation until the early 1960's; a fire destroyed the large dairy barn on January 16, 1962. Mrs. Helma Peterson, owner of the dairy was thankful that no lives were lost in the fire but feared that several animals died in the blaze. She stated that there were ten or eleven cows, several calves, and a bull in the barn, but in the darkness, they were uncertain if all animals were led to safety. Farm equipment, a farm tractor, milking machines and a milk cooler were also lost in the blaze. The Petersons reported that the barn would probably never be rebuilt, but there were still several other barns on the property. Amazingly the fire did not hurt the Constitutional Oak tree, which was located very close to the old barn.

The Peterson's sold the property in 1992 to Bonny Hartigan Current and her husband. Bonny was the sole owner of the property in 2012 and lived there until July of 2023 when she sold it to move back to her hometown. The blue saltbox, a large barn and the gray milkhouse still stand at the intersection, a stark reminder of history past. Across the street the 123-year-old Constitutional Oak still stands as






An early picture of the James Alcott House and barn located on the corner of Spindle Hill and Mad River Roads circa 1900

milk was stored and processed into containers for delivery. In the far-left back corner of the milk house there was an old walk-in electric cooler. It was quite large with thick walls and a huge door. I was happy to learn that new bit of information about Peterson's Dairy farm. Now each day as I drive by that old barn, I think about the rich history that the property holds.

This land was originally owned by James Alcott and the farm was referred to, as Sunnyside. It was located at the intersection of Spindle Hill and Mad River Roads. James Alcott was the son of John Alcott, the first settler on Spindle Hill in 1731. John gave each of his sons' property to build a house and establish a farm. James built his farmhouse, a saltbox, in 1774, and like his father was an early settler in the area.

In the late 1800s, Evelyn Upson purchased the house and farm and lived there until 1918. In October of 1901 Upson was the delegate from Wolcott to the Constitutional Convention. The purpose of the convention was to revise the

I can understand why Bonnie Fleming Richardson and her brother Lisle have such an attachment to this area because I too feel the same way after living just down the street for the past forty years in the house where Seth Thomas was born. There is just so much history to be found here.

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

January in History

Golden Gate Bridge is born

1933 — construction begins on the Golden Gate Bridge, as workers began excavating 3.25 million cubic feet of dirt for the structure's huge anchorages.

Samuel Morse Demonstrates the Telegraph

On January 6, 1838 — Samuel Morse's telegraph system is demonstrated for the first time at the Speedwell Iron Works in Morristown, New Jersey. The telegraph, a device which used electric impulses to transmit encoded messages over a wire, would eventually revolutionize long-distance communication, reaching the height of its popularity in the 1920s and 1930s.

First U.S. Presidential Election

January 07, 1789 — Congress sets January 7, 1789 as the date by which states are required to choose electors for the country's first-ever presidential election. A month later, on February 4, George Washington was elected president by state electors and sworn into office on April 30, 1789.

The First Colonial Constitution

January 14, 1639 — In Hartford, Connecticut, the first constitution in the American colonies, the "Fundamental Orders," is adopted by representatives of Wethersfield, Windsor, and Hartford.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Born

January 15, 1929 — Martin Luther King, Jr. is born in Atlanta, Georgia, the son of a Baptist minister. King received a doctorate degree in theology and in 1955 helped organize the first major protest of the African-American civil rights movement: the successful Montgomery Bus Boycott. Influenced by Mohandas Gandhi, he advocated civil disobedience and nonviolent resistance to segregation in the South. The peaceful protests he led throughout the American South were often met with violence, but King and his followers persisted, and the movement gained momentum.

Boston Thieves Pull off Historic Brink's Robbery

January 17, 1950 — 11 Men steal more than \$2 million (\$29 million today) from the Brink's Armored Car depot in Boston, Massachusetts. It was the perfect crime—almost—as the culprits weren't caught until January 1956, just days before the statute of limitations for the theft expired.

Iran Hostage Crisis Ends

January 20, 1981 — Minutes after Ronald Reagan's inauguration as the 40th president of the United States, the 52 U.S. captives held at the U.S. embassy in Teheran, Iran, are released, ending the 444-day Iran Hostage Crisis.

Toy Company Wham-O Produces First Frisbees

January 23, 1957 — Machines at the Wham-O toy company roll out the first batch of their aerodynamic plastic discs—now known to millions of fans all over the world as Frisbees.

Apollo 14 Departs for the Moon

January 31, 1971 — Apollo 14, piloted by astronauts Alan B. Shepard Jr., Edgar D. Mitchell, and Stuart A. Roosa, is successfully launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida, on a manned mission to the moon. On February 5, after suffering some initial problems in docking the lunar and command modules, Shepard and Mitchell descended to the lunar surface on the third U.S. moon landing. Upon stepping out of the lunar module, Shepard, who in 1961, aboard Freedom 7, was the first American in space, became the fifth astronaut to walk on the moon.
