

I know that many of you like to buy hunting and fishing licenses as gifts or stocking stuffers. If you would like to purchase 2023 licenses now, you can stop in to our office, and we will be happy to issue them to you. You can also purchase them on line by visiting the Department of Energy Environmental Protection websites: www.ct.gov/deep/hunting

or www.ct.gov/deep/fishing. The fees for 2023 hunting and fishing licenses are as follows:

- **Hunting License** \$19.00
- Inland Fishing License \$28.00
- Marine Fishing License
- All Waters Fishing License
- Combination Hunting/All Waters Fishing License

If you are 65 or older, you must renew your free hunting and/or fishing license every year. Please stop in the office and we will be happy to assist you.

Hunting and fishing books will be available online. It is unclear at this point if the State of Connecticut will be printing physical books as they have done in the past. (Prices are subject to change at any time by the State.)

# Thank You! There is more work to be done

I wanted you to know it has been a tremendous honor serving as your State Representative. I have been humbled by, and grateful for, being

re-elected and for the trust you have placed in me. Thank you for your continued support. I also wanted to extend my congratulations to President-elect Donald Trump on his hard-fought campaign and a successful election that is so important to the future of our country. This election will truly be remembered as the day the American people regained control of their country. I want to wish the President-elect all the best as he leads our great nation forward on a path of prosperity for all Americans.

I also wanted to provide you with an update on a few items:

#### **Suspected Marriage Fraud:**

Recently, two reports revealed what appeared to be an egregious misuse of Connecticut's marriage and election processes, orchestrated by Wanda Geter-Pataky (Yes, the same Geter-Pataky who was charged with abusing the absentee ballot system in Bridgeport).

The New Haven Independent published a lengthy report on Geter-Pataky's activities at New Haven City Hall, which have all the signs of fraudulently facilitating marriages between U.S. citizens and foreign nationals, possibly for immigration benefits. Dozens of people were lining up in the hallways and in one month alone, she was responsible for 114 marriages, mostly between people from another state, according to that report. And in Southington, a report by the Hartford Courant showed that there was an increase in similar activity at town hall, and both incidents demand immediate investigation.

We cannot ignore that the same individual facing these serious allegations of marriage misconduct is also charged with ballot fraud — a dual betrayal of the public's trust. The story also stated that she was accused of helping an illegal

immigrant illegally cast an absentee ballot, which calls into question what else she was up to when it comes to our elections.

As ranking member of the Government, Administration and Elections, I am committed to ensuring our state laws are followed and respected. It is troubling to see our marriage license system, a straightforward process for couples to begin their lives together, becoming a vehicle for potential abuse. Connecticut municipalities, already stretched thin, should not be burdened by fraudulent marriage activities that strain their vital records offices, while denying services needed by local residents.

Our communities deserve to know that laws are enforced and that public resources are protected. Fraud and manipulation of our civic processes erode faith in our institutions, and I call on both local and state authorities to investigate and prevent further abuse of Connecticut's marriage and election systems.

#### **Illegal Immigration**

Abuse of immigrations laws is not limited to border states. Every indicator shows that it is becoming a growing and expensive situation in Connecticut. By most estimates, the population of illegal immigrants in our state is more than 113,000 and increasing. For context, that is nearly the population of nearby Waterbury, which is the fifth largest city in the state! Due to the policies of extreme Democrats, Connecticut is a "sanctuary" state. That means the state limits the cooperation our law enforcement officers provide to Immigrations and Customs Enforcement to aid them in tracking down people who have entered the country illegally.

When the legislative majority turns a blind eye to our immigration laws, it attracts more and more illegal immigrants to our state, and you, the taxpayer, are left footing the bill for health care, utility bills, public safety services, schooling, you name it. And in Connecticut's case, it is like funding an entire extra city, on your dime.

Taxpayer-funded healthcare (approved by the Democrat majority) for undocumented immigrants blew past its budget by \$10 million last fiscal year and is on track to exceed the budget by \$20 million this current year, which is seriously impacting our resources for core government services that legal residents rely on. While majority Democrats ignored our warnings about this problem last year, families across Connecticut are now paying the price.

With state agencies now forced to make cuts, it's time for action. We must immediately suspend unsustainable programs that provide free services to those who are here illegally and commit to eliminating them in the next budget cycle coming up this legislative session. Connecticut taxpayers deserve fiscal discipline and real financial relief — not policies that deepen our debt and ignore the needs of our legal citizens.

Life isn't all about politics. As we approach the holidays, it reminds us that despite the ongoing political debate the bonds of family, community and country are still deep and lasting. This is the season for sharing goodwill, helping those in need, and celebrations with friends, family, and co-workers. It is a special time for our children and a time to remember our own childhoods. ## **Wolcott Historical Society - December 2024**

This month I will revisit some quilting history. Quilts have been around for hundreds of years, but during the mid 19th century a particular type of quilt, the friendship quilt, became very

popular for several reasons. First, as settlers began to move away from their hometowns a friendship quilt was given to them as a remembrance of their friends and family. Secondly, they were cherished gifts from friends and families during a nostalgic time in history. Friendship quilts came in two forms: the signature quilt and autograph quilt. Both were usually made of a single quilting pattern, which meant that each square was the same design and made up of different scrap materials. Usually, one person sewed each square together to form the large quilt. The difference between the signature

quilt and autograph quilt was what was put on the squares. The squares of the signature quilt contained only the signature of the person who made that square while the square of the autograph quilt had a short verse as well as their signature. All of these signatures and verses were written

in indelible ink. Judy

Anne Breneman, a researcher of historical quilts, states, "Friendship quilts took time collecting fabric or blocks from each person, piecing them together and quilting the layers. Individual blocks on a quilt may have been made over several years and sometimes they were not put together into a quilt until years later. No matter how they were made they all had the same purpose, to record memories of cherished friends and family members."

On September 22, 2024, the Wolcott Historical Society received another historic quilt donation. The quilt is the Augusta Somers Miller quilt which dates back prior to 1864. It was owned by Augusta's daughter, Margaret Hall who was one of the founding members of the Society and at one time our town historian. This beautiful piece of our town's history was donated by Bonnie Fleming Richardson, Margaret's granddaughter and Lisle Fleming, her grandson. The quilt consists of six rows with seven squares in each row. Several of the squares have no names or the names are illegible. The rest of the squares have been signed or printed by someone associated with the Somers / Miller family. Some of the names found on the quilt are Miller, Hotchkiss, Frisbie, Kenea, Woolworth, Somers and Hayes. Considering its age, the quilt is in very good condition.

The following is a brief history of the Miller/ Northrop/Hall family. Margaret's childhood was an interesting one. She was the third of six children born to Charles and Mary Ann (Pierpont) Miller on February 24, 1889, at East Farms and Oak Corner in Waterbury. This property is located on the corner of East Main Street and Frost Road. Her mother's family also lived close by on Pierpont Road, which was near the Wolcott town line. The Miller children spent many hours working and playing on these beautiful farms. Margaret's father, Charles S. Miller

was a blacksmith; he was mechanically inclined and could repair or build just about anything and farm too. He was also an active member of the Mattatuck Drum Corps serving as leader for over fifty years as well as playing the snare drum and teaching drumming. The band would meet at the Miller home and Margaret and her sister Ruth would fall asleep while the band practiced loudly downstairs. Charles also researched genealogy and shared that knowledge with residents all over the state, which meant much traveling around the state. On many of his travels Margaret accompanied him.

Margaret married Clifford W. Northrop on November 17,1910 and lived in Waterbury. They had had four children Marian A, Betty, Jean M and Nita P. Clifford who was eleven years older than Margaret passed away in October of 1936. Margaret's second husband was George Hall who was from West Hart-

ford and Wolcott. They resided in the historic David Bailey House located at 335 Bound Line Road facing the Green. They referred to this property as Juniper Ledge and enjoyed many years there with their adult children and grandchildren. It was during these years that Margaret became very involved with the local history and the establishment of the Wolcott Historical Society and the renovation of the stone schoolhouse museum on Nichols Road. She also loved to lead Sunday school and Girl Scout groups to a large piece of

bedrock, behind the Grange Hall in Wolcott, on the "Juniper Ledge" estate, to point out the glacier marks found on it. Also, in this area across from Brooks Hill Road there is a large boulder that glaciers dropped and is named the "Ordinary."



The new quilt has been added to our collection at the Center School History Museum. The Museum now

houses four autograph/friendship quilts. One is a 150-year-old signature quilt donated in 1985 by Hazel Pierpont. The quilt belonged to Beatrice Garrigus Pierpont of Maple Hill Farm on Pierpont Road in Waterbury. Her mother, Saphronia Elizabeth Upson Garrigus, gave

the quilt to Beatrice. There are thirty-seven names signed on this quilt. The second quilt is an 1848 autograph quilt, which was a donated by Margaret Hall Carpenter, a longtime resident of our town, who was living at the Masonic Home in Wallingford in 2010 when she donated the quilt. Margaret's grand-

father was Ransom Hall. The quilt is in excellent condition for its age, but more importantly it is like reading an old autograph book. It was made for Lucelia Merrill who was born and lived in Wolcott from March 30, 1831, to October 7, 1908. Each square on the quilt has a message for Lucelia from her friends. The fourth quilt is the Atwood quilt. In January of 2015, Walter Atwood invited me to accompany he and his wife, Sue to Washington, Connecticut. They were meeting with Sue

Reich, a quilt appraiser, to have several of the family's antique quilts appraised, one of them being a friendship quilt with many well-known Wolcott residents' signatures on it. To my surprise, at the end of the appraisal, they informed me that the signature quilt was being donated



to our Historical Society. Iva A. Miller square

This 1860s signature quilt from the Atwood family measures approximately 7' by 6' and is in excellent condition. Sue Reich felt that it was probably made after the Civil War because the brown fabric colors and particular quilt pattern are typical of that time. The quilt block pattern is called Chimney Sweep, Album Block or Christian Cross, which is the most popular design used in signature quilts.

The Wolcott Historical Society is honored to preserve these treasures of our past and hope that you might want to enjoy them as well. All these quilts are available for your viewing at the Center School History Museum at 154 Center Street. To set up an appointment call me at 203-879-8918.



## **Veneer Options**

omposite veneers and porcelain veneers are two popular options for enhancing the appearance of teeth, each offering distinct advantages and considerations. 



Whether you agree with him or not, President Trump's landslide victory was a testament to his unmatched ability to connect with voters of all backgrounds, delivering a clear message that he is working for them to clean up government, restore freedom and opportunity, and move away from the heavy hand of government programs and interference.

This election was not merely a victory for one man it signaled a nationwide shift toward Republican policies and values. Even in entrenched blue states like California, Republican support surged, with several traditionally Democratic counties flipping red. Florida's Miami-Dade County, a longtime Democratic stronghold, also turned red.

Connecticut was not immune to this shift. Of our 169 towns, nearly all saw improved Republican vote totals compared to 2020. According to the New York Times, Connecticut was among the top five states to shift its margin toward President Trump by 7.3 percent. This result, though overshadowed by continued Democratic dominance in the state legislature, is cause for optimism and proof that the tide is turning here as well.

Yet, it's frustrating to see that this national Republican momentum did not translate into gains in our state government. Despite an energized electorate, Democrats expanded their majorities in the General Assembly, gaining four House seats and one Senate seat. With more than a twoto-one advantage in both chambers, the Democrats' grip on Hartford remains ironclad.

Why did this happen? The simplest explanation is often the right one. While Republican ideas resonate — both nationally and here in Connecticut — Connecticut Republicans have failed to define a strong, cohesive brand identity. Republican leaders in this state continued to distance themselves from the national party, narrowly focusing on economic issues while avoiding social topics and, at times, appearing timid in opposition to the Democratic majority. This approach has not provided voters with a clear message of what Connecticut Republicans truly stand for.

However, this election also demonstrated that when Republican candidates are fearless in defending American principles and traditional conservative values, they succeed. Candidates who champion fiscal responsibility, protect civil liberties, empower parents in education, support law enforcement, and push back against illegal immigration, inflation, rising utility rates, and the Democrats' woke agenda — like tampons in boys' restrooms, DEI mandates, and pronoun policies — performed exceptionally well.

I am living proof of this strategy. By unapologetically standing for these values and making my positions clear to my constituents, I have been able to earn their trust and deliver results. Connecticut Republicans should take note: This is the path to rebuilding our state and giving voters a voice with which they can identify.

As we enter the new legislative session, I am committed to working within Senate Republican leadership to unify our party around these values. We must establish a bold, distinct Republican identity that resonates with voters across all of Connecticut—one that stands firmly for opportunity, affordability, freedom, and common sense. When we show voters that we are willing to fight for these ideals, we can earn their trust and create the kind of change Connecticut desperately needs.

Our brightest days are ahead. I firmly believe that we will usher in a new era of prosperity for our state when we give Connecticut residents a voice that reflects their values and delivers on our promises. That is why I ran for re-election, and that is why I remain committed to being the loudest voice for rebuilding Connecticut and defending our great country.

### **Boy Scout Troop 230**



**Contact your School Nurse with questions** 

- Physicals are state-mandated for Pre-k, K, 6th, and 10th grade
- 7th grade state-required meningitis vaccine and Pre-K flu shots
   An updated order for epipens (and the medication) is needed to participate in athletics, safely attend field trips, and dances/prom. New doctor orders are needed each year for medication (including Tylenol and Motrin).

 Forms can be found on www.wolcottps.org -> Departments -> Health Services -> Forms,

- Medication should be in its original container with their name on it. The medication needs to be brought in by the parent (unless self carry orders) and given to the nurse.
- Vision and hearing screenings will be taking place Parents will be notified if a referral is recommended. Parents may exempt their child from screenings for religious reasons and must provide the school with a written request for exemption.
- Students must have a signed sunscreen form on file each year and self carry and apply it.
- If a child requires crutches or a wheelchair a MD note is needed for them and to use the elevator.
