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The CT Prevention Network Announces \$570,000 in Grants to Support Youth Cannabis Prevention

Connecticut - The CT Prevention Network is excited to announce the recipients of the Youth Cannabis Prevention-Cannabis Coalition Grant, a new initiative aimed at bolstering efforts to reduce cannabis use among youth and young adults in Connecticut. A total of \$570,000 in funding will be awarded to two local coalitions in each region, with each receiving a grant of \$57,000 to support their cannabis prevention programs from January 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026.

The grant, provided by the Connecticut Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS), is part of a broader, statewide effort to curb cannabis use among individuals under 21 and enhance community-level responses to cannabis-related challenges. "This funding will enable coalitions to make a substantial, lasting impact on reducing youth cannabis use while strengthening community infrastructure to address these critical issues for years to come," said Sarju Shah, Director of the Prevention & Health Promotion Division at DMHAS.

The following organizations have been selected to receive funding:

- Region 5 Western RBHAO: Western CT Coalition, Inc.
- Naugatuck Youth Services, Step Up Naugy Coalition
- Wolcott CASA

"We are proud to support these coalitions in their vital work to protect Connecticut's youth," said Pamela Mautte, President of CT Prevention Network "Through this grant, we are investing in evidence-based programs that will equip communities with the tools they need to educate young people, families, schools, and local organizations about the risks of cannabis use and offer proactive solutions."

The Youth Cannabis Prevention-Cannabis Coalition Grant initiative is managed by the Regional Behavioral Health Action Organizations (RBHAOs), which provide regional prevention infrastructure to support youth cannabis prevention efforts and promote responsible adult-use cannabis. This collaborative framework ensures that funded coalitions have the necessary support to implement evidence-based programs and foster long-term prevention strategies. Grantees will implement comprehensive youth cannabis prevention programs, including community engagement efforts and educational campaigns aimed at youth, parents, schools, and other key stakeholders. These initiatives will build on proven strategies to reduce youth cannabis use, empower local communities, and foster long-term prevention efforts that prioritize the health and well-being of Connecticut's young people.



# Proposals for the 2025 Legislative Session

The new legislative session has begun, which means that the majority will be flooding the Capitol with new (and likely bad) bills. I will of

course stand up to legislation that I disagree with, but I have also proposed common sense bills that I believe will benefit our communities and students, strengthen the integrity of our elections and enhance public safety.

I wanted to share with you several of those bills below. I have included summaries of some of the legislation, but in some cases the title of the legislation is self-explanatory.

#### **Our Schools:**

SB 40 - To study the feasibility of allowing parents to visit their child's classroom during the school day.

Parents should have the right to know what is going on in the lives of their children, and having the opportunity to visit a class to view what is being taught is crucial to their development.

HB 5314 - An Act Permitting School Districts to Opt Out of The Common Core State Standards

When local school districts implement successful programs that work, why should they be required to use Common Core (a confusing educational program that has failed to produce better outcomes for our students)? We need to support districts that are getting it right and allow them the flexibility to implement their own curriculum.

HB 5313 - An Act Concerning Freedom of Expression and of the Press for Students

Protection of student expression and student publications, including political and religious views, is important, and this bill protects the expression or publications except when they are obscene, libelous, slanderous or disrupt school activities.

#### Your Rights:

HB 5340 - An Act Prohibiting the State from Mandating a Covid-19 Vaccination

HB 5341 - An Act Prohibiting Employers and Public Officials from Requiring Proof of a Covid-19 Vaccination

HB 5344 – An Act Permitting a Moral or Philosophical Objection as an Exemption to the School Immunization Requirements

The decision to take a vaccine should be left up to individuals, not mandated by the government, and I will continue to support your freedom to make the choices that you feel are best for you, and your family.

#### **Protecting Women and Girls:**

My Republican colleagues have introduced legislation that would protect our children by prohibiting the prescription of puberty blocking drugs for minors, stop the prescription of artificial cross-sex hormones for minors, and prevent the practice of surgical intervention for minors for the purpose of sex reassignment or treatment of gender dysphoria.

Another of our proposals would prohibit biological males from participating in girls' sports and from accessing girls' locker rooms and bathrooms. These are commonsense solutions that would help prevent injuries in girls' sports and stop the irreversible, live-changing medical treatments on children.

#### **Safeguarding the Community:**

SB 345 – An Act Ensuring that Local and State Government Officials Fully Cooperate with Law Enforcement Personnel in the Enforcement of Federal Immigration Law

Connecticut has become a sanctuary state for illegal immigration (which needs to be reversed), and this bill would require the state to abide by federal law and ensure that local and state officials cooperate with law enforcement agents while they enforce immigration laws. We have seen many cases where violent criminals entered the United States illegally and were released from custody after committing new crimes while in the country. That practice needs to end.

SB 352 - An Act Restricting Early Release for Persons Convicted of Crimes Involving Sexual Assault or Firearms

As we have seen in recent headlines, felons who have committed horrific crimes continue to be released early from prison due to faulty criminal justice policies put in place by the Democrat majority. Too often the focus at the Capitol has been on making laws that benefit offenders, not legislation that considers victims, and it is about time the most dangerous in our communities serve the sentences they are given so society can be protected.

And we will again introduce legislation that reduces electric energy costs and removes Public Benefits Charges from electric bills. As ranking member of the Government Administration & Election Committee I have proposed legislation that strengthens our election laws, including adding a requirement that voters present a photo ID before they cast a ballot, that signatures on absentee ballots be verified and that mandatory minimum sentences for elections crimes be instituted.



# The Mature Mouth - part 2

nonth's column, here is the second installment of the information on mature mouths; the issues that can arise and some helpful tips to mitigate those problems.

Physical limitations: As we get older, our bodies abilities start to meet their limitations more frequently. The athletic endeavors, like a jog or tennis match, become a greater challenge. Similarly, the manual dexterity needed to effec-

tively care for our mouths can become compromised. Generally, I recommend three things to help overcome this challenge. 1) larger handles for your toothbrushes. Often times electric toothbrushes come with larger handles. These larger grips are easier to hold and manipulate. Further, electric toothbrushes do a more efficient job at removing plaque. This leads to my second recommendation, 2) spending an extra minute or two for your oral care routine. Don't rush. If dexterity limits are slowing down your brushing and flossing, then just take your time. Electric toothbrushes can help with this as well, because they do a large portion of the movements needed to remove the plaque and debris. Lastly, 3) switch to floss with a handle. String floss can be a real challenge to even the most dexterous of fingers. There are a couple of varieties of these, so find the one that works best for you.

Aging Dentistry: Everything in our lives has a functional lifespan. Shoes, cars, televisions, etc. Dentistry is no exception. Fillings and crowns are no exception. Though we might not be aware of it, our mouths are a really tough environment. Hot soup to cold seltzer. Chewy taffy to hard nuts (and the accidental popcorn kernel). We subject our mouths to a lot of wear and tear. As we age, this wear and tear adds up and even the most meticulously performed dentistry will eventually reach the end of its functional life and need replacement.

As the treadmill speeds up, we have to walk quicker just to stay in place. The habits that we formed through our lives might no longer be enough to get the job done as elements of bodies and lives change. But, being aware of these potential pitfalls and compensating for them will allow us to spend more time enjoying life and less time in the dentist's chair.

# **Wolcott Historical Society - February 2025**

ast month while driving on Central Avenue my navigation system showed a body of water there as "Theriault's Ice Pond." I had never thought about the different names that body of water had been given throughout the years, Wilson's Pond, DellaBella's Pond, Lily Lake and Todd's Pond and it

made me start to think about the lakes and ponds in our town and how they came about. This month I will discuss some of that history and the winter use of these ponds.

Alan Russell, who grew up in Wolcott has researched a great amount of Wolcott history over the years. In September of 2015 he wrote an excellent description of "Lakes and Ponds" in his September blog that I would like to use as part of this article. "The topography of Wolcott does not lend itself to naturally occurring lakes or ponds. The terrain is quite hilly as the town is part of the "foot-

hills of the Berkshires" which are themselves part of the Appalachian Mountains. This is a very old mountain range and the part in Connecticut was worn down not only by the passage of time, but by the last ice age. The highest elevations are in the NE part of town with a few spots topping 1000' (the high point being 1046'). In contrast, where the Mad River exits the town between Route 69 and Woodtick Road the elevation is only 450'. Thus, all the lakes and ponds in town are artificial ones that were created by building dams across the many streams/brooks/rivers that flow through town. Most of these are earthen dams, but a few, such as the dam that creates Scovill Reservoir, are more substantial ones of masonry or concrete." Alan lists approximately nineteen named ponds or lakes in Wolcott. For his complete list google (Russell's Ramblings -Ponds and Lakes). Many of these ponds were used in the winter months as ice ponds and each had an icehouse that was found next to it.

The ice industry or ice harvesting was started in 1806 by a New England businessman Frederic Tudor. Ice was sent by barge, railroad or ships to the South and Caribbean Islands and became a lucrative business. Most Americans didn't have refrigerators until the 1940s so, keeping food fresh was a hit or miss proposition. Many homes had "ice boxes or cold closets" which were usually made of wood and lined with tin or zinc. They were insulated with materials such as cork, sawdust or straw. These iceboxes needed large blocks of ice to keep them cold. Therefore, the ice business became a well-established and important industry during this period of our history and some Wolcott residents earned a living producing ice to fill them. I have found information on several ice ponds with ice houses and ice businesses.

Theriault's Ice Pond was created by damming the Lily Brook and had several names depending on who owned the land around it. In 1848 the pond was used by Streat Todd as part of his sawmill operation. By the 1930s the Theriault Ice Company began using the pond for their ice making business. They had a commercial icehouse at this location on Central Avenue. Mr. Edward Theriault serviced residents of Wolcott and surrounding towns until several years of mild winters forced him to close the icehouse and sell the land to DellaBella"s Mushroom Company. The DellaBella family raised mushrooms on this farm for many years.

The Moroz Ice Pond was found along Wolcott Road across from Nichols Road and today is owned by the Wolcott Lion's Club. Sometime between 1900 and 1930 the pond was created by the damming of Old Tannery Brook. They used dynamite to create the 3.5-acre pond. In the 1930s it was owned by Mr. Frank Morozuk (the "uk" at the end of the name meant Ukraine) of 259 Wolcott Road, who used it as an ice pond. The pond is still there, but the icehouse, which was later renovated into a home, and became part of the Herbst family property was rented out for many years. Several years ago, the house was sold to CPE Electric who had the Fire Department burn it for practice, and then built the warehouse that is there now.

Another icehouse was located on Ranson Hall Road at Evers Pond. This 137-acre farm was purchased from Ranson Hall in 1904 by James and Mary Bergen and at that time had an icehouse on the property. The following is the recollection of it by Clarence Atwood. The icehouse with which I was more familiar was that of Mr. James Bergen at Sunny Hill Farm on Ransom Hall Road. When the ice became thick enough, he would use a plow-like piece of equipment, which a horse pulled across the ice, producing straight furrows clear across the pond. Then he marked right angle furrows, which produced ice cakes, about two feet by four feet. An old auto engine on runners with a two-foot buzz saw was then drawn along the lines to cut the ice cakes nearly to the bottom. A long chute led from the water's edge up the bank and into his icehouse. Beginning at the water's edge, a channel was opened across the pond and ice cakes, one by one beginning at the far side were pushed along the channel and up the ramp into the icehouse where they were bedded in sawdust. This ice was used as needed to keep his milk cool until it could be delivered to customers on his daily milk route. Some ice was chipped and spread on the milk bottles to keep them cool during delivery. Sawdust was used as an insulator to keep the ice from melting, and it did indeed, so the supply of ice lasted until the next harvest season. Sometimes someone helping with the ice harvest fell into

the water. The unlucky person was pulled out of the water and hustled up to the nearby house to get thawed and dried out. Often, he was offered a good stiff drink of hard cider or sometimes some good homemade brandy. Our own farm (Atwood farm on Woodtick Road) had an icehouse and a small pond nearby, but it fell into disuse before my time. The James Bergen, Sunny Hill Dairy Farm icehouse on Ransom Hall Road continued to be used by the Evers family when they purchased that property sometime in the late 1950s or early '60s.

Welton's Ice Pond was found on the right side of Spindle Hill Road at the bottom of the hill just south of Wakelee School before the Waterbury town line. It was called Icehouse Pond, but its proper name was Welton Pond. It was one of the earliest ponds in Wolcott. It received its name from the Welton brothers who lived on either side of it in the mid-1800s. It is on Col. Richards Brook, as is Chestnut Hill Reservoir. The lower part of Col. Richards Brook below Chestnut Hill Reservoir is now called Old Tannery Brook. (I also remember some people calling it Pritchard's Pond, but I'm not sure why.) The icehouse was located next to the pond and is still standing today, it is used as a storage garage. Back in 2013 I interviewed a couple, Jean and Tony Bosco and they had this to say about that ice pond and icehouse. "We would watch as the men cut the ice and haul it up to the icehouse using an elevator system to move the ice. They would put hay on the ice to keep it from melting. This worked well and the ice stayed frozen all summer long.'

Over the years, I have researched and found the names of about thirty farms that were found in Wolcott, but I know there were many more and each farm, no matter the size had the same needs, water, land to plant crops, fields for the livestock and a way to preserve the food that they produced. I'm sure many of these farms had small ponds and ice houses or deep cold cellars to store their food through the summer, but if they did not, there was an ice business that supplied them with the ice they needed.

Back in the late 1950s and mid 1960s there was still an ice company located at 1149 Wolcott Road; it was Souza Ice Service. The Stone Schoolhouse Museum has two ice picks advertising this business. I remember when I was growing up in the 1950s, we would walk up Wolcott Road past the Souza Ice Service. Dan Souza and his wife still live at that location.


