

Vital Record and Election Updates

To Get Married: To obtain a marriage license you must apply in the town you are getting married in. Please call ahead to see if that town requires an appointment or if you can just walk in. Due to the overwhelming number of out-of-state

marriages being performed in Connecticut, many of the larger cities have a waiting period when you apply. All Connecticut municipalities follow the same state law, but each office has their own policies.

Getting a Marriage License Certified Copy: You can obtain a certified copy of your marriage license from the town you were married in and the town you and your partner lived in at the time. There are options to mail in for your records if the town hall hours do not work with your schedule. If you move, the records do not follow.

Getting a Birth Certificate: You can obtain a certified birth certificate from the town you were born in or the town your mom was living in at the time. However, ALL births starting in 2003 to present can be obtained from any town as they are available through our online portal. You won't be able to print from home because there is special paper, and a raised seal required.

Getting a Death Certificate: For death records same rules apply. In 2020 a new system rolled out which now allows death records to be purchased from any town in Connecticut.

Elections: It seems that every month there is a new change to the election process. As Town Clerks, it is our sworn duty to learn the new laws, actively keep our offices modernized, and do whatever it takes to ensure voter privacy and accuracy. While most election duties are handled by the Registrar of Voters, we have many responsibilities in preparing the ballots, ordering the ballots, updating the online voting system, and issuing absentee ballots.

In May, my staff and I will be heading to Hartford for training on the new election machines. This way we can be prepared and ready for the November election. It will be new, and change is never easy, but please bear with us and our election officials as we navigate together. When a little overwhelmed, I remind myself what a privilege it is to vote, what a great nation we live in, and how honored I am to be your Town Clerk and serve our amazing little town.



It was made for the purpose of helping heal and rekindle friendships and to allow people the opportunity to visit loved ones in their hometown who otherwise may not be able to make the trip to Washington. The Town of Wolcott's Veterans Advocacy Commision is coordinating with various organizations to bring the Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall to our town. It will be located at the Woodtick Recreation lower by the pavilion.

Wolcott Historical Society - March 2025





It's almost 200 years since our library had its humble beginnings in the Congregational Church. This year some major changes are planned for the structure that opened its doors on Bound Line Road in 1970. Change for our library has been slow, but steady and dates back to the early 1800s.

In 1828 Dr. William Andrus Alcott was the Sunday School Superintendent at the Congregational Church. Dr. Alcott was an educator, medical doctor as well as cousin to Amos Bronson Alcott. He graduated from Yale with a medical degree, but his love for education and books was also important to him. As Sunday School Superintendent, he wanted books for his pupils to read so he made a gift of twenty books to the church and established the first town library. The library was housed in and supported by the church for almost one hundred years.

An air of unrest was felt in the Congregational Church in 1839 when Reverend Chapman became pastor. He was a strong anti-slavery proponent, but not everyone in the parish agreed with his ideas. An anti-slavery meeting was scheduled in the church on

December 12, 1839. The night before this meeting, someone placed gunpowder with a slow wick in the stove. Shortly after 9:00 p.m. an explosion was heard, but it wasn't until after midnight that someone saw the church in flames. By morning the church was reduced to ashes; there was no library from 1839-1843. The Church dissolved its relationship with Reverend Chapman and began plans for a new church. The new church was completed in 1843, and the library was once more up and running with a \$100 donation from Preserve Carter. The new library was housed at the entrance of the new church.

Stephen Rogers served as pastor of the church from 1859-1863. He was a strong supporter of the church library, but poor health caused him to give up his pastorate. Before he retired, he donated 133 volumes to the church library. In September of 1873 the Congregational Church Parish celebrated its Centennial. The library was expanded when town leaders, including Amos Bronson Alcott donated books as part of this celebration. Alcott's donation included works by the Concord authors: Nathaniel Hawthorne, Ralph Waldo Emerson and Dr. William Andrus Alcott Henry David Thoreau.



The library continued to grow while housed in the church. From 1912 to 1917 Reverend Furness served as pastor. During his pastorate he expanded the number of books in the library and built a container in which to store the books. Beecher Memorial Parish Hall was presented to the townspeople in 1915 and given into the custody of the church. It became the new home of the library, which continued to grow for ten more years.

In 1924 the library was moved into our newly built Town Hall. It was housed in a room off the entryway where it remained until 1957 when renovations required it to move once again. The Center School was being used for town offices, so the library was moved into the basement of the Center School. Sixteen months later, when Town Hall renovations were completed, the town offices were moved back to Town Hall leaving the

entire Center School building available. In 1959 the library was moved from the basement of the Center School to its new home upstairs, taking over the entire building. This served as our public library until the present library was opened on Bound Line Road.

The Center School Library continued to rapidly grow; records showed that in 1966 book circulations climbed to a new high of 18,601 and 369 new

borrowers were enrolled. Library hours were increased to 32 hours per week. Space was at a premium at the Center School library so First Selectman, Edward Bagley had the old vault emptied to add floor space, but this was only a temporary fix. A meeting was held with the State Librarian to discuss inadequate space issues and availability of State and Federal grants.

Soon a Library Study Committee was established with Nicholas D'Agostino as Chairman, John H. Washburne as Vice-Chairman and Mrs. Florence Marino as Secretary. The other members were Reverend Sherman Andrews (Episcopal Church), David Herbst, Mrs. Ann Donahue, Alexander Nole, Robert Ducham, Richard Opper and Dr. Charles C. Sasso, Jr. They discussed the need for a new public library and made recommendations on location and size of the library.

In the 1967-68 fiscal year a Library Building Committee was established with Alexander Nole serving as chairman. The members were: Francis Byrnes, John Keating, Joseph Ciarlo, Mrs. Gloria Lanosa, Mrs. Geraldine

D. Cullen, Martin McCallum, Gloria D'Agostino, Dr. Charles C. Sasso, Jr., Robert Ducham, Edson Seymour, Lucian Helaire, Mrs. Isabelle Way, David Herbst and Earl L. Wooster, Jr. The unique look of the new library was the brainchild of landscape architect Leslie Searle who believed that a building must fit into the topography of the land.

Our library became a reality in 1970. Volunteers agreed to help move the books from the Center Street location to the new Bound Line Road location starting on October 17, 1970. The Center Street library closed on October 16th and the new structure opened on its formal dedication of October 25, 1970, with over 1000 people in attendance. Alexander Nole, stated it was, "a dream come true." First Selectman, Edward Bagley, said, "a momentous step forward in the life of the town of Wolcott." He also remarked that there had been controversy over the design of the building, but he believed it turned out to be a "forward looking structure" that reflected the attitudes of the townspeople. The building budget was \$375,000, but Wolcott only paid \$275,000 because of a \$100,000 state grant.

In 1994 the Library's Youth Room was named for Alexander Nole whose 30 plus years of hard work and dedication helped to make the library a reality. The Junior Women's Club chose the library youth room as its special project raising funds for furniture, books, and cassettes for this new room.

They also donated \$5000 towards the development of the room by selling signed prints, note cards and post cards of the town Green by artist Tracy Sugarman.

Today the Library has morphed into a bustling community center offering residents a variety of books, technology and

programs. These changes were gradual, but very significant. Sue Ouelette, who served as the Children's librarian for many years added a variety of programs for children. In 2018 Sue became the new library director and the programs continued to grow. She retired in August 2024 and the new library director; Matt Earls took over with the same continued enthusiasm.

There are now programs offered for almost any age level and interest group. You can find programs offered at all hours of operation as well. The library has also become a meeting place for those students enrolled in home-school programs.

If you have not stopped recently by the library, give it a try, you will be pleasantly surprised. The Wolcott Public Library has come a long way from

those early years in the Congregational Church when the first 20 books were donated back in 1828. Now it's exciting to see what the new addition holds for the future of our library. I will be giving a PowerPoint presentation on the library history on March 13th at 2:00pm.

The Fall of DEI is a Victory for America

espite its name, "Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI)" policies are not about fairness, opportunity, or unity. They are a thinly veiled system of race and gender-based discrimination designed to divide Americans for political gain. Rather than fostering meritocracy, DEI reduces people to identity categories,

rewarding or punishing them for traits beyond their control. It is not a mistake or a misunderstanding — it is a deliberate tool of power that undermines the principles of equal opportunity and individual liberty.

There is only one race: the human race. Yet DEI reduces people to nothing more than their skin color and gender, treating these superficial traits as determinants of worth and capability. But, skin color, like eye color or shoe size, is completely irrelevant when it comes to intelligence, character, work ethic, or competence. It is an external trait that tells us nothing about an individual's ability to contribute to society. Any policy that prioritizes skin color in decision-making is, by definition, racist.

True fairness does not require racial or gender sorting. If discrimination is wrong in one direction, it remains wrong in all directions. Remarkably, DEI policies insist that discrimination is justified as long as it serves their ideological objectives. This is racism and gender discrimination repackaged as progress, and it must be rejected.

The only relevant factor in an employment decision should be the employee's ability to fulfill the demands of the job at hand. Biological differences between men and women exist, particularly in physically demanding jobs. A 90-pound woman should not be required to lift 100-pound boxes just to satisfy a diversity quota, nor should biological men be allowed to compete in women's sports, where they hold an undeniable physical advantage. The erasure of biological distinctions under DEI is not only unfair — it is dangerous.

A core fallacy of DEI is the idea that individuals should be rewarded or punished based on historical injustices. No one inherits history, guilt, or virtue — these are not passed down through blood but shaped by individual choices. Assigning privilege or victimhood based solely on skin color or gender is a gross oversimplification that ignores personal history, struggle, and achievement.

Policies that grant advantages or disadvantages based on race or gender foster resentment. Those who lose out due to DEI feel wronged, and those who benefit may question whether they earned their success. This creates distrust, not unity.

DEI policies empower bureaucrats to decide who is privileged, who is oppressed, and who deserves special treatment. This is a direct violation of America's founding principles of individual liberty and equal protection under the law. Government should not be in the business of racial and gender favoritism, doing so is unconstitutional, divisive, and morally indefensible.

Supporters of DEI frequently talk about "structural racism," yet DEI itself is structural racism. It institutionalizes race-based decision-making, ensuring that identity, rather than ability, determines success. If the goal were genuine fairness, DEI policies would be unnecessary — individuals would be judged on merit alone.

The real path to opportunity is not race- or gender-based favoritism, but capitalism — a system that rewards talent, effort, and innovation. In a free market, businesses succeed by hiring the best people, regardless of race or gender. Discrimination is bad for business, and companies that engage in it lose to those that prioritize competence.

History proves this. The minimum wage, for example, was introduced in part by white labor unions in the early 20th century to prevent Black workers from competing for jobs at lower wages. (Source: Mises Institute) Like DEI today, it was framed as fairness but in reality, it limited opportunity and harmed those it claimed to help.

Despite the salesmanship of progressive Democrats, DEI is not a well-meaning attempt to correct injustice; it is a deliberate political strategy designed to divide, control, and erode the foundations of fairness and meritocracy. It replaces individual liberty with collective guilt, creates resentment, and institutionalizes discrimination under the guise of progress. Merely suggesting a color-blind society sends the political left into a frenzy because the idea directly threatens their agenda, which depends on keeping people categorized, resentful, and in perpetual conflict. But we must reject their divisive tactics and strive for a truly color-blind society — one that values individuals for their character and abilities, rather than allowing propagandists, con artists, and politicians to keep us divided for their own power and profit."

The nation must continue supporting the Trump Administration's bold efforts to roll back DEI policies across the country—an essential step in restoring fairness and unity. By dismantling race- and gender-based hiring, training, and education policies, it reaffirms the American ideal that individuals should be judged by merit, not by identity. This is a significant victory in the fight against racism and bigotry— one that moves us toward a more just and truly equal society.

America was built on the idea that every person deserves the chance to succeed based on their own merit. The Trump Administration's efforts to dismantle DEI policies represent a crucial step toward restoring that vision. If we want a future defined by opportunity rather than division, we must reject DEI in all its forms and reaffirm the principle of equal treatment under the law.

Bills of the Wild, Wild Left

onnecticut is once again at a crossroads, and the legislative agenda being pushed by the majority party in Hartford is a roadmap to disaster. As a strong advocate for

smaller government, lower taxes, and personal freedom, I cannot sit idly by while harmful bills threaten our state's economy, property owners, law-abiding citizens, and taxpayers. I wanted to share with you my 2025 edition of the Bills of the Wild, Wild Left. From forcing you to vote, to attacks on property owners, this list is just some of the outrageous proposals that have come up so far, this legislative session.

Let's start with housing and labor. The idea of allowing striking workers to collect unemployment benefits (SB 8 & HB 5760) is absurd. Unemployment benefits are for those who have lost their jobs, not for those who choose to walk off the job. This will force businesses to bear even more costs and could lead to job cuts or even closures. Meanwhile, the expansion of Fair Rent Commissions and additional funding for rental assistance (SB 1159) is nothing more than government overreach into the housing market, which will drive up costs for everyone.

Another attack on property owners comes with HB 6891, which prohibits security deposits greater than one month's rent, removing crucial protection for property owners. Add SB 996, which would prohibit the landlord from evicting a tenant because the lease agreement has expired and HB 6490, which would cap rent increases and allow tenants to file complaints, and you have a recipe for discouraging property investment in Connecticut. Instead of making it easier to build and rent housing, these bills will drive landlords out of the market, reducing housing supply and making the crisis worse.

The attack on election integrity is just as alarming. HB 5755 would force candidates into the Citizens' Election Program, taking away their right to choose how to finance their campaigns. HB 6473 would allow incarcerated individuals to vote, rewarding criminals with rights meant for law-abiding citizens. The most outrageous proposal, HB 6471, would force people to vote — turning a personal choice into a government mandate.

If that wasn't bad enough, the majority party is also trying to silence dissent in the Senate (SR 7) by restricting the length of debate and removing the ability for a filibuster (the last resort of the minority party to push back against legislation). Free and open debate is the bedrock of democracy. When legislators try to limit

discussion, they are trying to hide bad ideas from discussion and remove any possibility of compromise on legislation.

Then, we have government waste and mandates. HB 6754 weakens Connecticut's fiscal guardrails, setting us up for future financial disaster. SB 866 allocates \$500,000 in taxpayer dollars to fund West Hartford Pride, a special-interest event that should not be receiving public money. HB 5619 seeks to impose yet another tax on Connecticut residents — this time on paper checkout bags. HB 6500 would interfere with private property rights by forcing landlords to give tenants the first right of refusal when selling property.

Public safety is also under attack. HB 6385 and HB 5330 would raise the minimum arrest age from 10 to 14, removing a critical tool for law enforcement to deter youth crime. SB 492 seeks to establish overdose prevention centers (translation: government-sanctioned drug dens).

This session's legislative proposals are an all-out assault on businesses, property owners, taxpayers, and law-abiding citizens. We need to reject this dangerous agenda and fight for policies that promote economic growth, personal responsibility, and public safety. Connecticut deserves better and my fight in Hartford on your behalf will continue this session.






Target on Tyrrell
