





# Connecticut's Budget Priorities: Fiscal Responsibility or Political Convenience?

pecial education funding is a critical necessity for Connecticut's municipalities, ensuring that towns can support students without overburdening local taxpayers. Unfortunately, instead of properly funding towns, the Democratic majority has once again

relied on budgetary gimmicks — not to improve education, but to circumvent their own fiscal rules.

For years, Democratic leadership has put Connecticut's municipalities at the bottom of the priority list. Their spending formula is clear: state employees and their benefits come first, then the massive entitlement bureaucracy that supports them., Only after that do they consider municipal aid. The result is skyrocketing property taxes as towns are forced to make up for the state's shortfalls.

I have always prioritized municipal aid because funding towns properly reduces the pressure to raise property taxes, something Connecticut desperately needs. That's why I supported the original \$40 million special-education funding bill when it passed unanimously earlier this year. Then, Governor Lamont inexplicably vetoed it. Normally, this would lead to an easy override vote. Instead, Democrats saw an opportunity to sidestep their own spending caps and funneled the same \$40 million into an off-the-books account using "emergency certification" — a process that bypasses public hearings and committee review, leaving taxpayers in the dark.

There was no reason to avoid a transparent process other than to evade Connecticut's bipartisan fiscal guardrails—rules designed to protect taxpayers from reckless spending. These same Democrats had unanimously supported these budget guardrails (also known as spending caps) in early 2023 at the urging of legislative Republicans. Governor Lamont himself recently called them "sacrosanct." However, when following them became inconvenient, they chose to ignore them.

If their goal had been to truly help students, they would have had a better option. Republicans responded to this maneuver by proposing an amendment to more than double the funding — offering \$92.2 million for special education within the budget guardrails. Every Democrat voted that amendment down — making it less about funding schools and more about bending financial rules to fit their agenda.

At the same time, Democrats approved another bill that funnels \$3 million to politically connected advocacy groups, including organizations focused on illegal immigration and gender-affirming care. Among the recipients were: Planned Parenthood, which received \$800,000 despite having over \$2.5 billion in assets; Hartford Gay and Lesbian Health Collective, which received \$387,500; New Haven Gay and Lesbian Community Center, which received \$225,000; Integrated Refugee & Immigrant Services, which received \$225,000; Junta for Progressive Action, which received \$62,500; and Anchor Health Initiative, which received \$62,500. These organizations were hand-picked with no public vetting and there will be nearly zero oversight on how these taxpayer dollars are spent.

Meanwhile, Connecticut families struggle with affordability. Electric rates remain artificially high due to the public benefits charge, which Republicans are fighting to remove. Property taxes are among the highest in the nation, yet towns are forced to beg for funding while millions go to well-connected special interest groups.

To put this in perspective, I offered an amendment redirecting this \$3 million toward Meals on Wheels for seniors and the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program—funding that would help those most in need. Democrats voted it down on party lines.

What happened in the legislature weeks ago wasn't just fiscal irresponsibility; it was a blatant display of misplaced priorities.

Special education funding should be managed transparently and responsibly. Instead, Democrats exploited it to undermine Connecticut's hard-fought budget stability while simultaneously directing taxpayer money to ideological groups with no accountability.

If we want a government that serves the people, we must hold lawmakers accountable for following the budget rules they themselves voted into law. We need to properly fund municipal aid to reduce property tax burdens. We must stop politically motivated spending and focus on real affordability solutions.

I will continue fighting for responsible budgeting, protecting taxpayers, and demanding transparency. If the majority refuses to put Connecticut residents first, then it is up to the public to demand better.

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## **Wolcott Historical Society - April 2025**

Patriots' Day is celebrated on the 3rd Monday in April, and marks the historic Battles of Lexington and Concord, April 19, 1775. It was known as "The Shot Heard Round the World." As poet Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, "...it was the first battle that started

the American Revolutionary War, paving our path to freedom." On July 10, 2017, Patriots' Day became an official (unpaid) holiday in the state of Connecticut. We join five other states Maine, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Florida and North Dakota that celebrate this day with pride.

Prior to that 2017 date, Stacy Perrone-Petta worked closely with Senator Joe Markley (16th District), Rep. Rob Sampson (80th District) and Historian Alex Bugaeff (Ellington, CT) to initiate the day as an official holiday in Connecticut. Her passion for our veterans and American Heritage runs deep. A forever Miss CT America 1996 and USO performer, she has been entertaining and honoring servicemen and service women for over 30 years. In 2016, along with the support of the town of Wolcott and the honorable Mayor Thomas Dunn, she started a local Patriots' Day Celebration. It has been a wonderful way to honor our local veterans and share stories of our American History. It serves as a day of remembrance to all those that fought for our freedoms as well as the birth of our nation.

I recently met with Stacy to discuss a different way to celebrate Patriots' Day this year. We have developed a history scavenger hunt that can be completed as a family adventure while learning about some of our patriots from the American Revolution and our local history. This event will take place on April 12th starting at noon at the Center School History Museum at 154 Center Street. At that time, you can pick up a brochure, a map and an envelope to hold the clues to begin your adventure.

Participants must visit all 9 historic sites listed below. At each site you will see a container with a clue. You will take the clue and move onto the next site. Once you have collected all 9 clues and put them together, they will direct you to your final site. At that last location someone will hand out the last bit of history and your prize. We are hoping that you will learn a little local history while celebrating some of our patriots from the past and having fun. The sites are listed below.

The Congregational Church was established on November 18, 1773, it was known as "The Meeting House on Benson's Hill." Across from the church on the town green is where the first militia practiced. It later became known as the Mattatuck Drum Band. You will find a clue at the church.

The statue of the "Soldier on the Green" was erected in 1916 and dedicated on July 4th of that year. Leverette Dwight Kenea of Thomaston presented the statue to the town in memory of his grandfather, John Jordon Kenea who fought in the Revolutionary War as a soldier from Wolcott. He is buried in Edgewood Cemetery. You will find a clue here.

The Ordinary or the Great Gray Rock is located on Bound Line Road south of the Episcopal Church. It dates to 1678 and served as the northeast corner boundary of ancient Waterbury. It dates to when the original settlers purchased the land from the Tunxis Tribe. You will find a clue here.



The Ordinary or Great Gray Rock is located on Bound Line Road cross from Brooks Hill Road.

Nathaniel Lane was a soldier of the Revolution who is buried in Edgewood Cemetery. Find his tombstone. He served in the Militia Regiment and died in 1840 at age 76. Edgewood cemetery is located on Bound Line Road. You will find a clue here.

The Constitutional Oak tree is located on Spindle Hill Road just past the intersection of Mad River Road. It was planted by Evelyn Upson in 1902. Upson was Wolcott's delegate to Connecticut's 1901 Constitutional Convention. Although no changes were made to our Constitution at that time, each delegate was sent home with a small pin oak tree to plant in a prominent place in the town. Upson planted his tree in his yard hoping to transplant it later but never did. The house where Upson lived is the James (Alcox) Alcott House circa 1774. James Alcott fought in the

Revolution in the 13th Co. Trainband 15th Regt. You will find a clue here at the tree which has been standing for 123 years.

The Old Thomas House is located at 36 Peterson Lane. This house was built in 1775 for James Thomas who fought in the Revolution and is buried in Edgewood Cemetery. James was the father of Seth Thomas, a famous clockmaker who made his first clocks in Wolcott on Spindle Hill. Seth was born in this house in 1785 and lived there until 1810. He wanted to build his clock factory in Wolcott, but the town would not improve the roads for his clocks to be transported to the Southington/Cheshire area. He left the area for Plymouth Hollow and established his clock factory there. Today that town is named Thomaston. You will find a clue at the James Thomas House.

The Spindle Hill area was the birthplace of Amos Bronson Alcott, a famous educator. Amos Bronson Alcott was born on the corner of Beach and Spindle Hill Roads, but the house where he was born no longer stands. The Solomon (Alcox) Alcott house replaced that house circa 1790. Soloman Alcott fought in the Revolution in the Militia from 1781 – 1782. In front of that house is a bronze plaque that was dedicated to Amos Bronson Alcott and his daughter, famous author, Louisa May Alcott. She was a well-known author BUT not born in Wolcott. She was born in Germantown, PA. You will find a clue here.

The Stone Schoolhouse located at 155 Nichols Road was referred to as the Woodtick School. It was built in 1821 and was enlarged in 1898. It is the oldest stone school in Connecticut. The granite stone for this school was quarried from the Wakelee Quarry near the Waterbury border. This school was used for 109 years. You will find a clue here.

Judah Frisbie was a soldier of the Revolution who is buried in Woodtick Cemetery. This cemetery is located on Woodtick Road. Find the tall Frisbie tombstone. Judah's stone is not visible now. You will find a clue here.

At the end of your scavenger hunt you should have 9 clues. Once you put these words into a sentence you will know where to go to get your prize. We hope that you will enjoy the hunt with family and/or friends.



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# The Journey of Dental Care

hough the idea of drilling out decay and pulling out teeth can seem decidedly medieval, dentistry has actually evolved significantly over thousands of years. It has transformed from rudimentary practices into a sophisticated field that combines art and science. The journey of dental care traces back to ancient civilizations, revealing a rich history filled with creativity and discovery.

Interestingly, archaeological findings suggest that they may have also used a form of toothpaste made from crushed eggshells, ox hooves, and pumice stone to maintain oral hygiene. Delicious.

The ancient Greeks and Romans advanced dental care further. Hippocrates, known as the father of medicine, wrote about dentistry in his medical texts, providing insights into tooth decay and dental surgery. The Greeks utilized gold, silver, and other metals to create dental appliances, setting the stage for prosthodontics. Meanwhile, the Romans emphasized oral hygiene, often using toothpicks and mouthwashes made from vinegar and salt.

As we moved into the Middle Ages, dentistry fell into the hands of barbers who performed extractions and other simple procedures. This period saw a lack of formal dental education, leading to many dangerous practices. However, in the 18th century, dentistry began to professionalize. Pierre Fauchard, often referred to as the "father of modern dentistry," published "Le Chirurgien Dentiste," which laid the foundation for contemporary dental practices. He introduced systematic approaches to oral health and described various dental procedures, significantly improving patient care.

The 19th century marked remarkable advancements with the introduction of anesthesia, which revolutionized dental surgeries. Dentists could perform complex procedures without the patient experiencing significant physical pain. Additionally, the development of the dental drill and the rise of dental fillings further enhanced the treatment of cavities.

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## The Cracks of Connecticut's Public Safety System

s a State Representative, one of my primary responsibilities is to ensure the safety and well-being

of Connecticut's residents. But alarming incidents, including the recent release of a horrific murderer and a sex offender, have revealed deficiencies that need to be immediately reviewed.

Earlier this legislative session, my fellow House Republicans and I proposed crucial reforms to Connecticut's Trust Act. Currently, that act stops Connecticut Law Enforcement from cooperating with federal authorities who are attempting to enforce immigration laws except under very narrow circumstances such as if the person is convicted of a Class A or B felony.


Our reforms would empower law enforcement agencies to collaborate more effectively with federal immigration officials when illegal immigrants are charged with serious offenses such as Class A, B, or C felonies, crimes like manslaughter, assault, sexual assault, and arson. And there are recent examples where this reform would have done some good. Take the case of Sanjay Sivan Walsh.

Walsh was sentenced in 2023 to 10 years in Enfield's Willard-Cybulski Correctional Institution after committing "unspeakable crimes against two children", of which he served 21 months, before the CT Department of Correction "declined to honor an ICE detainer against him and released him into the public," according to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Had our reforms been in place, Walsh would not have been released back onto the streets (serving less than half his sentence), which is exactly what happened.

And incidents like those are not isolated but show systemic problems that need to be addressed.

Just recently, the family of a murdered Bridgeport man said there was no justice when they learned that a psychiatric review board had released Tyree Smith (also known the Bridgeport Cannibal Killer). Smith killed Angel Gonzalez, and after attacking him in a vacant apartment, he ate parts of his body. It was such a shocking crime, and after he was found not guilty due to insanity, he was supposed to spend 60 years in a psychiatric hospital.



Instead, the review board decided to release him back into the community (he's now in Waterbury) after serving 12 years, ordering him only to wear ankle monitor.

Rightfully so, this decision caused outrage from the community. But it served to expose how deeply flawed our criminal justice system is when it comes to early release of offenders. How on earth can we trust that a cannibal will take his medications and is not a threat to the public? It is absurd.

Darren Yu Huang, a former Ridgefield resident, escaped from court-ordered mental health treatment at Silver Hill Hospital in New Canaan. Huang, previously accused of attempting to set fire to the same facility in February 2023, was arrested at JFK International Airport. Disturbingly, he was found carrying a hatchet, a sledgehammer, and a handwritten plan to shoot people. How did he escape?

This case is yet another example of the potential dangers when individuals with violent tendencies are not adequately monitored or restrained.

Equally troubling is the recent news in Waterbury, where a woman allegedly confined her stepson for two decades, failing to feed him and leaving him with no heat or air conditioning. The victim, now 32, weighed just 68 pounds after he escaped, which he achieved by setting fire to the residence.

Former educators say they had raised concerns about his well-being during his childhood, reporting signs of abuse and starvation to the Department of Children and Families (DCF) at least 20 times, according to NBC 30. Tragically, these reports did not result in intervention.

How does something like this happen? How is it that such serious allegations of neglect are not acted upon? And I do not always make serious incidents political, but I would be remiss if I did not point out that the Democrat majority continues to fund pet projects across Connecticut, and is more concerned about passing bills that would add a tax on paper grocery bags, rather than focusing on fixing the systems that allow people to fall through the cracks.

## **Wolcott Christian Life Center Celebrates 70 Years**

The Wolcott Christian Life Center (WCLC), on Wolcott Road across from the Dunkin Donuts, is celebrating its 70th anniversary this year. While April 18 is the official incorporation date, the church will recognize the milestone as part of the service on April 6th. Services are Sunday mornings at 10:30 and all are welcome. ## **Vegetable Planting Guide**

hat to plant and when: Connecticut has three different USDA Hardiness Zones, which means vegetables could be planted at different times during the calendar year depending on where the garden is located within the state. Since Connecticut has a shorter growing season, warm-weather crops are still an option but you may want to research newer varieties that can reach their harvest date within a shorter timeframe. Some of the best plants to grow in Connecticut include lettuce, Cole crops like broccoli and Brussels sprouts, greens like spinach and kale, beans, root crops and other cool-season varieties. Some perennial vegetables, like asparagus, do well in northern Connecticut and can provide a yearly harvest.

#### **Wolcott is Zone 6:**

April: Plant beets, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, kale, lettuce, peas, and spinach outside. Begin these crops inside in March. Begin tomatoes, peppers, and onions inside now.

May: Begin beans, Brussels sprouts, cucumber, corn, squash, and cabbage inside. Plant tomatoes and onions outside.

June: Plant peppers outside.

July: Plant beans, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, corn,

cucumber, and squash outside.

August: Plant beets and broccoli outside. Begin carrots, kale, lettuce, peas, and spinach.

September: Plant carrots, kale, lettuce, peas, and spinach outside






#### **Unified Sports Penguin Plunge**
