

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



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## Wolcott CASA Awarded **Youth Cannabis Prevention-Cannabis Coalition Grant**



Wolcott CASA is proud to announce that it has been selected as a recipient of the Youth Cannabis Prevention-Cannabis Coalition Grant, established to decrease HEALTHY WOLCOTT the use of cannabis among children, teens, and young adults in Connecticut.

The grant, provided by the Connecticut Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (CT DMHAS), is part of a larger statewide initiative aimed at limiting cannabis use among individuals under the age of 21. Wolcott CASA will receive \$57,000 to support its cannabis prevention programs from January 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026.

The Youth Cannabis Prevention-Cannabis Coalition Grant initiative is managed by Western CT Coalition, Region 5's Regional Behavioral Health Action Organization. WCTC provides regional prevention infrastructure to support youth cannabis prevention efforts and promote responsible adult-use cannabis. The collaborative framework ensures that selected coalitions are supported as they implement evidence-based programs and create long-term prevention strategies.

Wolcott CASA is committed to implementing comprehensive youth cannabis prevention programs, including community engagement efforts and educational campaigns aimed at young people, parents, schools, and other key stakeholders. These initiatives are designed to build on proven strategies to reduce youth cannabis use, empower local communities, and facilitate long-term prevention efforts prioritizing the health and well-being of Connecticut's young people.

## Whose Interests Are Connecticut Democrats Serving?

t's been just over 100 days since President Trump was sworn in for his second term. While Americans across the country are seeing bold changes aimed at restoring law and order, protecting taxpayers, and reversing the excesses of the last four years, Connecticut Democrats have taken a different path.

Instead of joining Republicans in solving real problems like unaffordable electric rates, rising crime, and declining quality of life - elected Democrats in Hartford are doubling down on fringe ideological battles. From school library porn to taxpayer-funded gender clinics and sanctuary protections for criminals, their priorities would be laughable if the consequences weren't so serious.

Let's take a look at what they've been up to.

You've likely heard the phrase "book banning" thrown around. It's become a favorite talking point of left-wing activists and now, sadly, many of our elected leaders. But let's be clear: no Republican is advocating for banning books.

What we're saying is simple: materials made available to young children in public school libraries should be age appropriate, and parents, through their locally elected school boards, should have the final say. That's it. That's the whole "controversy."

Yet Democrats have introduced legislation — deceptively titled the "Don't Ban Library Books Act" — that strips away local oversight and gives total control over library materials to unelected librarians. This means parents and school boards would have no say, even in cases where obscene material is made available to elementary school students.

I've seen the books in question. One of them, Gender Queer, was cited in public testimony. When I was interviewed by a local news station about the bill, the reporter agreed that the illustrations and text were so graphic they couldn't be shown on TV. That says everything.

Ideological principles, when grounded in reason and shared values, are essential to guiding sound public policy. It is both appropriate and necessary for elected officials to allow their core beliefs to inform their decisions. But what we're seeing from Connecticut Democrats isn't principled leadership — it's the imposition of extreme, unpopular views on the rest of us.

Nowhere is that clearer than in their obsession with gender ideology. This session, they've pushed bills to:

· Shield providers of "gender-affirming care," even for minors.

- Allow minors to receive treatments without parental consent or notification.
- · Expand protections for biological males competing in girls' and women's sports.

Across party lines, Connecticut residents disagree with these ideas. A solid majority — over 70% in recent national polls — believe that biological males should not compete in women's sports. Most parents, regardless of political affiliation, believe they should be informed about their child's medical care.

But elected Democrats in Hartford aren't interested in public opinion. Their mission is to advance an agenda that even many Democrats find extreme.

Illegal immigration is another example. It's one thing to be compassionate—but quite another to ignore the law.

Instead of cooperating with federal immigration enforcement, Connecticut Democrats have expanded the "Trust Act," which restricts local law enforcement from complying with federal detainer requests — even in cases involving criminal illegal immigrants. While cities like New York are beginning to acknowledge the real-world consequences of these policies, our state's leadership is moving in the opposite direction.

Attorney General William Tong recently made headlines for targeting Avelo Airlines—not for breaking the law, but for following it by cooperating with the Department of Homeland Security on deportation flights. Attorney General Tong is using the power of his public office—and taxpayer resources—to target a private company in an apparent attempt to punish and harm it, despite no evidence that the company violated any state or federal laws.

If that doesn't sound like a gross misuse of power, then I don't know what does.

While all of this is going on, Connecticut residents are struggling. Electricity bills are skyrocketing, thanks in part to the notorious Public Benefits Charge — a stealth tax that funds politically connected nonprofits and energy consultants. Republicans have been fighting for two years to eliminate this hidden tax and lower electric rates.

We've introduced comprehensive proposals to restore affordability and stop the bleeding. Democrats not only block our efforts—they mock us for trying.

Meanwhile, Democrats approved millions in funding for Nongovernmental Organizations (NGOs) that provide gender transition services and legal aid to illegal immigrants—while voting no, on strict party lines, to our Republican amendment that would have redirected those funds to support Meals on Wheels and low-income heating assistance.

For Connecticut's seniors and struggling families, their needs weren't just overlooked — they were deliberately deprioritized.

For a group that loves to accuse Republicans of being "authoritarian," Connecticut Democrats sure do a lot of dictating.

They want to:

- Tell parents they don't get to know what their child is learning or what medications they're on.
- Tell businesses they can't cooperate with federal law.
- Tell local communities they can't decide what books are appropriate for elementary students.

That's not democracy. That's not inclusion. That's government-knows-best authoritarianism wrapped in activist buzzwords.

The question every voter should be asking is: Whose interests are Connecticut Democrats serving? Because it certainly isn't families. It's not law-abiding taxpayers or small businesses. It's not seniors on fixed incomes struggling with heating bills. And it's definitely not the majority of voters in either party who just want sanity restored.

What we're witnessing is a government that has become completely unmoored from the people it claims to represent — driven by national activist groups, social media outrage, and a deep obsession with fighting Donald Trump, no matter the cost.

Republicans in the legislature are fighting every day to restore balance, empower parents, support law enforcement, and make Connecticut affordable again. We just need more people to join us.

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## **Wolcott Historical Society - May 2025**

recently received a package in the mail from a former resident, John Leyden. John and his family had lived at 443 Todd Road in the early 1940s. He attended the old Lewis School on Shelton Avenue which is

also referred to as the South School and he wanted to share his memories with us.

John started first grade at Lewis School on Shelton Avenue in 1945 and his memories of this school are quite vivid, even today at the age of 85. He remembers the school as a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  story brick building that was old even then. The wide cement stairs lead up to double front doors which opened onto a long, wide hall that ran the length of the building to the back door. Seventh and eighth graders shared the room on the right side of the hall while fifth and sixth graders shared the room on the left. Each of these rooms had a full folding wall facing the hall and when opened created one large room. Beyond the first two rooms stairs brought you to the lower level where grades one through four had their own smaller individual rooms. The girls' and boys' restrooms were on the opposite sides of the hall and the furnace and lunchroom were in the basement.

There was no kindergarten in Wolcott at that time so first grade was a big transition for students and mothers experiencing separation anxiety. John remembers the excitement of receiving his first pencil box about the size of a cigar box. It contained two new pencils, an eraser, a six-inch ruler, a half circle protractor that no one knew what to do with, a small plastic pencil sharpener and several other goodies. He remembers that most pencil boxes had a draw that slid out to keep folded paper in. These boxes were important to the children because they signified that you were finally going to school, and you even got to write your name inside the box.

John stated that before the school year began, he got some new clothes; a pair of black U.S. Keds, the \$2.00 variety, two pairs of blue jeans, a few new shirts, underwear and socks that were good for the first two months of school. Once November arrived, he would also get corduroy pants, a few long sleeve shirts and maybe a new coat if last year's was too small.

When the big day arrived, they got up early, ate breakfast and were ready almost an hour early. John and his mom walked the mile and a half down Todd Road to Lewis Avenue meeting other mothers and students along the way. When they arrived at the school, they waited for the bell to announce that it was "school time". Then they marched up the steps and down the hall as the moms steered them into their first-grade class. John stated that the desks were wooden affairs with open fronts to store your books and were arranged in rows, they took the first open seat. John

sat next to the windows, and he could see his friend Jacky Jay's house next door. Once they were seated, the teacher, Mrs. Curtain introduced herself and welcomed everyone. She then gave the rules. "No talking in class, no chewing gum, raise your hand to speak. There would be recess in two hours and they could use the bathroom before they went outside to play. If you could not wait, raise your hand and when called on, ask to use the restroom."

Mrs. Curtain then had each student stand one at a time and introduce themselves to the class. There were fourteen students in John's class and many knew each other from Sunday School at St. Peter and Paul's church. It was at this time that the teacher thanked the mothers for bringing their children to school and invited them to leave. She reminded them that school ended at three p.m.

John wrote that his first-grade teacher was a kind woman who worked hard to put everyone at ease and stressed to them that learning would be fun, and they would see changes in themselves that would make them feel good. She stated, "I promise you that by the end of this school year you will be able to read and read well, you will make new friends, and you will learn skills that you will use all your lives. Education is a journey, and I am glad you are here, starting your trip with me."

By the end of the school year, his teacher was right. They could read those first books of "See Spot run..." and then onto the weekly Scholastic Weekly Readers. They were able to do simple math, history and music. In the spring they planned a Mother's Tea and on May 2, 1946, at 2:00 p.m. they ushered their moms to the lunch-

room to sit at the tables that were covered with a tablecloth and had a vase of flowers in the center. They served tea and cookies that Mrs. Curtain had made, and they sang songs to their moms. When the school year came to an end, they were sorry to leave Mrs. Curtain, but excited to be home for the summer.

By second grade, John noted that students were able to cross the street to visit the candy store run by the Gibbons sisters, in the back of their basement. Their specialty was penny candy. John's second grade teacher was Mrs. Kibble. Second grade was also when students were able to go to the dentist through a school health program. Math became more important in second grade and marbles became a popular game on the playground. In third grade, John's teacher was Mrs. Summers, and this was the year they started using ink from the ink wells on the desks rather than pencils. It was good that the ink was washable because much of it ended up on their clothing. Fourth grade introduced multiplication, and they had to memorize the times tables. This was also the year new desks were added after spring break. These desks allowed students to lift the whole top of the desk. Fifth grade introduced science as a new subject, and everyone felt like they were inventors.

By sixth grade John was excited to have a male teacher, Mr. Dithers. John wrote, "He was a great teacher. He took personal interest in all of us. If you were having trouble in any area, he would ask you to stay after school for a few minutes to help him, but he then helped you. He brought structure to our playground after lunch. Where we had been on our own, Mr. Dithers organized sports; volleyball, kickball, races, jump rope competitions for boys and girls. That winter, he even organized a snowball fight, before we could get in trouble for throwing snowballs." Mr. Dithers also played the piano and every Wednesday afternoon, he would play music from Mozart, Liszt, Beethoven and more. On Friday afternoons he would read one of the classics, a chapter at a time. He even read "Little Women by Louisa May Alcott and reminded students that her father, Amos Bronson Alcott grew up in Wolcott. John felt that Mr. Dithers made enthusiastic readers of all his students.

At the end of John's sixth grade year, they were informed that they were building a new school on Todd and Woodtick Roads and it would be completed over the summer and next year they would be attending Frisbie Grammar School. They were sad to be leaving "their school" where so many memories were made.

John has written a wonderful narrative of his school adventures through sixth grade even listing his teachers and the subjects that were added at each grade level. It is obvious as you read these encounters that our town's education system was excellent even then. There are so many interesting details of his elementary years at Lewis School, but I cannot share them all. I am hoping to scan the complete seven-page story and have it on our website wolcotthistory.org soon.

As I read John's story, I couldn't help but remember the wonderful years I too spent in our school system. Life was different then in our town, but thankfully we have people like, John that are willing to share these memories that have stayed with him for his life.





Consider for a moment the alarming list of bills that have advanced from these committees and which could be called on the floors of the House and Senate: some of our majority colleagues are proposing to create a state-run account to funnel money toward travel and lodging for sex change operations and abortions, all under SB 7. This would essentially invite people from out of state to come to Connecticut for abortions, and this fund would help foot the bill, including paying for meals.

And it doesn't end there. We are now facing SB 1285, which would establish government-sanctioned "overdose prevention centers" — essentially drug dens that make a mockery of our community's safety and values. Shockingly, the proposal now under consideration in Hartford would allow anyone - no matter the age - to ingest any illegal drug they choose at one of these sites. That is not the way to address the drug crisis in our state, but rather it is a way to decrease public safety. HB 7042 seeks to expose Connecticut business owners who sell firearms or accessories to frivolous lawsuits. For instance, if a business were to sell a gun holster to someone, and that person went on to commit a shooting, that business would be liable under this proposed legislation. It is ludicrous and an attack on the Second Amendment. HB 6904 promises to provide unemployment benefits for striking

workers, potentially undermining the economic stability of the business community.

As if that were not enough, the radical proposals extend to HB 7033, which would allow people to set up tents or even live in their cars on public land, including sidewalks, plazas, and areas adjacent to parks and roadways — a slap in the face to law-abiding citizens who contribute to and invest in our communities. This would open the door to encampments on public lands, including town greens, commuter parking lots, you name it.

Then there's HB 6263, which insists on forcing the state and its contractors to rely solely

on costly battery-powered leaf blowers — a first step towards an eventual, full ban on gas-powered equipment by 2029. And finally, HB 5004, dubbed "Green Monster 2.0," throws more taxpayer dollars into costly programs that not only increase public benefits charges but also aim to eliminate natural gas — a cornerstone of our daily lives. Progressives will follow an ideology regardless of the cost to you and I, and it is showing in each one of these pieces of environmental legislation.

These bills, and many others like them, represent not the measured governance we deserve, but a dangerous overreach of radical ideas that fail to respect the values of common sense, fiscal responsibility, and law and order. As your representative, I stand firmly against these misguided legislative proposals. I will continue to fight in the House for legislation that truly puts the interests of hardworking families first—not one that peddles political ideology at the expense of our community's well-being.





## **Dentistry's Dark Secret**

ental care is pivotal in maintaining oral health, and various treataments like fillings, crowns, and dentures play significant roles. Although these interventions are designed to last for many years, it is essential to acknowledge that nothing in life — including dental work — is permanent. generally last between 5 to 15 years, *Wolcott, CT* depending on the filling's location, and the patient's oral hygiene habits. While modern materials are more durable than ever, the reality remains that fillings are not a lifelong solution and need

Dental crowns are designed to cover and protect damaged teeth and can last significantly longer than fillings, ranging from 10 to 30 years. The longevity of a crown depends on the type of material used — ceramic, porcelain fused to metal, or gold — as well as how well the crown is cared for. Crowns are not placed on healthy teeth, they are packed on teeth with large fillings, cracks or teeth that have had your canal treatment; therefore, maintaining them with excellent home care and regular dental check-ups is critical. Even with proper care, the crown material or the underlying tooth can deteriorate, necessitating replacement.

Dentures, whether partial or complete, provide a functional solution for missing teeth but don't have an infinite lifespan. Typically, dentures last around 5 to 10 years before they need to be relined, repaired, or replaced. The aggressive environment of the mouth — exposure to bacteria, acids, and wear from chewing — can contribute to the deterioration of denture material. Additionally, changes in the structure of the jaws and gums over time necessitate adjustments or replacements to ensure a proper fit and function.

Ultimately, while dental treatment vastly improves our quality of life and oral function, it is crucial to understand that they are not usually permanent solutions. The oral environment presents unique challenges that can compromise even the best care. Regular dental visits with a trusted hygienist, an excellent and meticulous dentist, good daily oral hygiene practices, and being indful of lifestyle choices, are vital in extending the lifespan of dental work. Acceptance of the impermanent nature of dental treatments will hopefully encourage proactive management of oral health and underscore the importance of ongoing care.




